





Orion Splashdown:

Live streaming from Orion as it approached the Earth

Splashdown:

The Orion capsule successfully splashed down in the Pacific Ocean after a fiery reentry into the Earths Atmosphere on 11th December 2022. The view of the eleven parachutes being deployed to reduce speed to 30 kph before splashdown was sufficient evidence to know that the heat shield had done its job, completing a hugely successful mission to the Moon. At time of splashdown it was exactly, almost to the hour, 50 years since man had last stepped on the moon.



Bill Nelson from NASA Administration said, 'We are adventurers, we are explorers, we always have a frontier, and that frontier is for us to continue to explore the heavens.' The Artemis 1 Mission opens a new chapter in interplanetary travel.

Although December and January are bitterly cold nights, they are by far the best of the year for celestial observation. The recent spell of clear frosty weather has been so good for observations.

December 24th & 25th 10 pm: Christmas Eve:

In the SSE we have a beautiful sky with **Jupiter** and **Neptune** setting in the SW, **Mars** is bright to the SE, with the **Pleiades** just to right (beautiful through binoculars) and the constellation of **Orion** directly under Mars. **Sirius** is low in the SSE (151° with altitude 16°). **The Big Dipper (The Plough)** is in the NE, continuing to climb during the night being virtually overhead by 4 am. The two stars that mark the end of the 'pan' of the Big Dipper, point upwards towards the pole star **Polaris.** The latter does not move at all as it marks the **Celestial Pole.**

On Christmas morning,

appropriately, the star **Regulus ('Little King')** is rising in the East. It marks the end of the '**Sickle of Leo'** that outlines the head of the constellation Leo. It is only 80 light years away and is a rapidly rotating star at 317 kilometres per second, which distorts its shape to an oblate spheroid. Regulus is one of the brightest stars in the night sky and has four companion stars, one with an orbiting period of 125,000 years.

January 1st, 2023:

We start to lose **Jupiter** that has been so bright in our evening skies. By January it is starting to set. Close to Jupiter on the right is **Io, Ganymede, Europa** and further to right **Calisto. Saturn** sets at about 630 pm. **Andromeda** is high in the southern sky 185° and altitude of 77° in the constellation of Andromeda. There are three stars in a straight line, **Almach, Mirach and Andromeda Delta (•)** just below the Andomeda galaxy (that is how I find it). The Eastern sky, of course, is alive with stars with Orion. A good pair of binoculars will let you see **The Orion Nebula** situated in the scabbard of Orion's Sword. It is one of the nearest stellar nurseries to Earth and one of the most active star formation regions of the Milky Way. It is home to tens of thousands of new stars formed within the last ten million years.

January 4th:

This marks mid-winter. Strangely in mid-winter the sun is closer to the earth than in the summer. This is because the orbit is elliptical not circular. The earth is about 5 million kilometres closer to the sun in January. This makes the sun 7% brighter currently.

January 6th: Full Moon.

This full moon was known by the early Native American tribes as the **Wolf Moon** because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled.

January 23rd:

Constellation Auriga: In a similar position in the evening sky for much of the month i.e. Above Orion. It contains three galaxies in close proximity, M36, M37, and M38.

January 30th:

In the pre-dawn sky **Mercury** is at its greatest elongation of 25°. At 7 am Mercury will emerge in the east and reach 7° above the horizon before dawn. As Mercury is the planet closest to the sun it is very difficult to see at any time. But this is as good it gets.

ESA's Class of 2022:

ESA has chosen its 'class of 2022' for astronaut training. Among them are three men and two women including Rosemary Coogan from Northern Ireland. She holds two degrees from the University of Durham in Physics and Astronomy. She went on to complete a doctorate in Astronomy from the University of Sussex in 2019.

Also, British Paralympic sprinter John McFall who was chosen as the first disabled astronaut by ESA. He says that he hopes to inspire others and show that 'science is for everyone' and potentially that 'space is for everyone'. More than 22,000 people applied to join the ESA programme – two and a half times the previous interest when the competition was run in 2008.

Square Kilometre Array (SKA)

Construction of the **Square Kilometre Array (SKA)**, the world's largest radio telescope has begun. It will be built on two continents consisting of about 130,000 antennae in Australia and South Africa, with operating headquarters in the United Kingdom.

It will be sensitive enough to detect a mobile phone in an astronaut's pocket on Mars, which is 225 million kilometres away. It will finish construction at the end of the decade. It will allow astronomers to look back at the beginning, examine 'black holes', study gravity, dark matter and even discover life on other planets.

With **Artemis 1's** success we end 2022 on a high note. Space travel has also now entered a new age. Thanks also to the **JWST (James Webb Telescope**) we can look in and watch stars and planets forming and look back close to the beginning of this universe.

Heartbreak for Skryne Ladies in Leinster Final

Leinster Ladies Intermediate Football Championship – Final

After an excellent first-half where both teams battled and traded scores like two prize fighters, Skryne couldn't keep the momentum going in the second-half and the more experienced Longford Slashers took control of proceedings and did enough to see off a spirited challenge from the girls in blue and white.

Skryne supporters were out in force in the well-appointed Kinnegad venue. The weather was almost perfect apart from a strong breeze which favoured Longford Slashers in the opening half. The Slashers didn't hang around and were straight out of the traps with three points in the first three minutes with Kyana Lee, Kate Shannon and Jessica Barry(a free) all finding the target. Skryne responded with two quick-fire goals, the first from Ciara Smyth whose pointed effort dropped in under the crossbar to level matters before Amy O'Dowd won the kick out from the first goal and soloed past a number of Longford Slashers defenders before dispatching the ball to the left of the keeper to put Skryne ahead with just 5 minutes on the clock. Longford Slashers response was immediate after they won their kick out and attacked up the field. Kyana Lee found space in front of the Skryne goal and shot low past the advancing Rachel Whelan to level the game. Kara Shannon edged the Slashers ahead with a fine point from the right-hand side. Skryne added a third goal when Amy O'Dowd picked up the ball on the right-hand side. She hit a pass over the top of the Slashers defence to Ciara Smyth. Smyth had to battle for the possession, but came away with the ball and slalomed past a number of Slashers defenders before hitting a low shot into the far left corner of the net. Skryne added a point after Liz Morland won the ball back superbly in midfield before working it forward to Amy O'Dowd who soloed forward before stroking the ball over the crossbar. Two pointed frees from Jessica Barry reduced the deficit to a single point midway through the half. Fiona O'Rourke who covered every blade of grass in the first-half sent a sweet pass to Ciara Smyth in the 17th minute. Smyth rounded her opponent before tapping over. A minute later Grace Shannon, who had a fine game for the Slashers, made a run deep into the Skryne defence before laying off to Jessica Barry who had found space in front of the Skryne goal. Barry hit a low shot to the back of the Skryne net to wrestle back the lead from Skryne. Ellie Murphy leveled matters again with a pointed free after Ciara Smyth was fouled on the 21metre line. Kate Shannon bagged her second point of the game when a Jessica Barry free dropped short into the Skryne penalty area. Aisling Cosgrove won possession and laid it off to Kate Shannon who popped it over with her left boot. Skryne replied with a fine point from Caitriona Keogan after Fiona O'Rourke sent a nice pass into Roisín McManus who rounded her marker before passing to Caitriona who lofted a monster kick over the bar clearing the nets behind the goal leaving the sides level for the third time in the half. Longford Slashers edged ahead again with a minute remaining in the half when Jessica Barry added her fourth free of the half. The referee blew the half-time whistle in a half that nobody wanted to see end, such was the quality of the football from both sides. Halftime: Skryne 3-04, Longford Slashers 2-08.

Skryne had the wind advantage in the second half, but despite this, it was Longford Slashers who took control of the game, pinning Skryne back for most of the third quarter. After showcasing excellent free-taking skills in the first-half Jessica Barry was guilty of missing two early frees as Slashers looked to capitalise on their early pressure. Kate Shannon finally opened the scoring 7 minutes in when she stroked over a free. Skryne too spurned some chances in the third quarter and then lost Ciara Smyth to a soft yellow card 16 minutes into the half at a crucial point in the game. The Slashers made the most of the extra player scoring a goal and a point during the period with Jessica Barry pointing a free before she got on the end of another Slashers attack after player of the match Orla Nevin passed a ball over the Skryne defence to Barry who despite a number of Skryne challenges, managed to get a shot away which found it's way into the Skryne net. This put six points between the sides with 9 minutes remaining. Skryne began to up the ante and pushed forward in search of scores to reel the Slashers in. Roisín McManus pointed a free before second-half substitute Ruth Moore hit a lovely point from the left-hand side with just 3 minutes remaining after good work from Roisín McManus and Niamh O'Brien. Unfortunately for Skryne, the clock was against them and the Slashers dug in and repelled the remaining Skryne attacks to prevail on a scoreline of Longford Slashers 3-10, Skryne 3-06.

Skryne will be very happy with their season after securing the Intermediate Championship in Meath and putting in some excellent performances in the Leinster Club Championship. Ultimately, they came up against a strong Longford Slashers team who were runnersup in the Leinster Championship last year and had a big point to prove in today's final after last year's disappointment. With a team full of young blood, this is just the beginning for Skryne who can look forward to playing Senior Championship Football next year.

A special thank you must go out to all our go-games referees that togged out and enabled us to host games. Our teenagers have stepped up and shown great leadership by on the field. We now have 23 qualified go-games referees with 58 matches reffed between them in 2022 – Bualadh bos!

1. <u>www.irishgenealogy.ie</u> This free site is published by the Dept of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media and is a must for researching Irish Family History.

2. <u>www.genealogy.nationalarchives.</u> <u>ie</u> This free site is invaluable for Irish genealogy research. Log in to see the sources it contains.

3. <u>www.familysearch.org</u> This a free site. Family Search is an international organisation to help people discover their family history. The Mormon Church provide it.

Next, we come to **subscription sites** that are not free and some are quite expensive. The following are the genealogy sites that I recommend.

1. <u>www.rootsireland.ie</u> This excellent site has the most extensive and searchable site of Catholic Church records. You can search county by county. The annual subscription is €168. I highly recommend it.

2. <u>www.findmypast.ie</u> It's quite expensive at €23 per month but I also highly recommend it.

3. <u>www.myheritage.com</u> This is an extremely popular and versatile heritage site. I have my Family Tree published on this site. Again, it's not cheap and costs about €170 per annum.

As mentioned at the outset there are many sites and it's quite easy to get lost and confused hopping between then all. The **12** I have mentioned are more than enough to get on with – the old cliché "Practice makes perfect" definitely applies here.

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
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How long should you sleep when you are over 50?

The Year in Review

Senior A League

Skryne Seniors kicked off their season on 05th March with a narrow one-point victory over Gaeil Colmcille in Grangegodden. Their second round game against Ratoath was cancelled and would not be played until July. The third round in Simonstown was a night to forget. Skryne came back from a 5-point half time deficit to lead by 4 points in the second half. However a disastrous last quarter saw Simonstown hit 2 goals and as many points to secure a flattering 5 point victory. A superb fourth round win over Championship runners-up Summerhill followed by a draw against Na Fianna in Enfield saw Skryne move up the table. Skryne continued their good form with victories over Ballinabrackey and St. Peter's Dunboyne to leave them second in the table behind St. Colmcilles. Skryne hit a blip in Ashbourne in Round 8 when they met a lively Donaghmore/ Ashbourne outfit who proved too hot to handle as Skryne slipped to only their second defeat of the League campaign. It was back to winning ways in June when a depleted Skryne team battled to a four-point victory over Navan O'Mahonys with Niall Finnerty hitting 9 of Skryne's 15 point tally. Skryne travelled to Gibbstown for Round 10 where they produced the display of the year with a scintillating performance of aggressive attacking football against Wolfe Tones, securing a 6 point victory over the defending County Champions. Skryne finally faced off against Ratoath in Skryne on O6th July. It was a match that was certainly worth waiting for with both sides producing some excellent football and quality scores in what was a high-scoring encounter. Ratoath prevailed on the night and this proved a setback for Skryne who dropped back to fourth place in the League table and now needed a victory in their remaining League game against St. Colmcilles to secure a place in the final. Colmcilles had been top of the League table for most of the campaign and it was a case of winner takes all in the last League game as whoever grabbed victory was guaranteed a place in the League final. Skryne found James Conlon in superb form on the night and it was his goal in the last quarter that steered the Cilles towards victory in a tight match. Alas Skryne didn't make the final but overall they showed some real positives throughout the League and looked to be in a good place heading into the Championship.

Skryne reign victorious in the Kilmacud 7s

A high point of 2022 was Skryne's march to victory in the All-Ireland Kilmacud 7s, the first Meath club to win the prestigious competition in it's 50 year history.

Skryne were drawn in Group 5 where they secured victories over Ballinteer St. Johns (Dublin), Steelstown Brian Ogs (Derry) and hosts Kilmacud Crokes (Dublin).

Skryne were drawn to play Fermanagh's Erne Gaels in the quarter final and racked up an impressive 5-12 as they strolled into a semi-final against Blessington (Wicklow).

The semi-final looked comfortable for Skryne as they raced into a 10 point lead midway through the second half (Each half is 10 minutes in length). Skryne looked home and dry, but then Wicklow champions Blessington hit 3 goals without a reply from Skryne to move within a single point of the Taramen. Skryne held their nerve and managed to secure the single point victory to advance to the final.

Skryne met Galway champions Mountbellew Moylough in the final and they proved to be much stiffer opposition. The Galway men racked up point after point in the opening half and led by 4 points at the midway point of the half. Ciarán Lenehan struck a goal for Skryne to drag them back into the game but the Galway men continued to pick off points and led by 3 points at half-time on a scoreline of 0-8 to 1-2. Skryne put in a battling performance in the second half that saw them chip away at the Mountbellew Moylough lead and draw level as the game entered the final minute. However, Mountbellew Moylough hit a point in the final minute and it looked like they had done enough to claim the victory. However, Skryne had other ideas and the Smyth brothers, Eoin and Shane combined brilliantly as Skryne launched a final last gasp attack which ended with Shane Smyth hitting a low shot to the left bottom corner of the Mountbellew Moylough net to snatch victory for a jubilant Skryne.

Championship

Skryne were drawn in Group A, a tough group which included defending County Champions Wolfe Tones, League Finalists St. Colmcilles and neighbours Seneschalstown.

Skryne faced Wolfe Tones in the opening round in Pairc Tailteann and were forced to line out without talisman Darragh Campion. Goals win games and Tones managed to find the net 3 times in this match, the second at a crucial time in the game in the third quarter when Skryne had cut the Tones 5 point half time lead to just a single point. A third goal followed quickly after and this killed off Skryne's challenge.

Skryne travelled to Walterstown for Round 2 against Seneschalstown and after a low-scoring first-half, Skryne moved up a gear in the second half and produced a dominant performance to easily defeat the Yellow Furze men who had pulled off a shock victory over St. Colmcilles in the opening round.

The final group game saw Skryne face St. Colmcilles in Stamullen with a win guaranteeing Skryne safe passage to the quarterfinals. Cilles had lead for most of the game bbut Skryne rallied in the final quarter hitting five points without a reply to take the lead. They extended the lead to 2 points 4 minutes into injury time and looked odds on to claim the victory. However Cilles had other ideas and David Bell hit Skryne with a sucker punch when he half-vollied a crossfield ball to the back of the Skryne net to edge the Cilles ahead. Remarkably the sides still had time to score another point each, but Cilles held out for the narrowest of victories. Despite the loss, Skryne had done enough to in the earlier rounds to progress to the quarter finals on score difference.

Skryne faced losing finalists Summerhill in the quarter final in Pairc Tailteann. It was a day to forget for Skryne who had a bad day at the office and struggled to get a foothold in the game. Summerhill were in flying form and ran out easy victors on the day.

Overall Skryne made a lot of progress through the year and had a good outing in the League, finished in the top 8 in the championship and claimed a fantastic historic victory in the All-Ireland Kilmacud 7s. Skryne can look forward with a lot of positivity to 2023.

Junior Premier Cup

Skryne played two of out their three games in the Premier Cup. The first round was an away game against Donaghmore/ Ashbourne who produced an excellent first half performance and looked like they would run out easy winners, but Skryne had other ideas and a fantastic second half in which Skryne hit 8 points without reply saw them take the lead as the game approached full-time. However a late goal from Donaghmore/ Ashbourne earned them a draw in an entertaining game.

Round 2 saw Skryne face Ratoath minus seven players that featured in the opening round against Donaghmore/Ashbourne. Ratoath were too strong for Skryne and prevailed on a scoreline of 2-08 to 0-06. Round 3 was cancelled due to Storm Eunice.

A League - Division 3A

Skryne played 7 games in the league winning 3 against St. Colmcilles, Trim and St. Ultans, drawing 1 against Carnaross and losing the remaining 3 against Ratoath, Gaeil Colmcille and Castletown. Overall, considering the small squad, Skryne had a decent campaign.

Premier Championship - Division 1

Skryne found the going tough in this group and shipped 3 defeats leaving them facing a relegation playoff against Wolfe Tones. Our u15 boys focused on development with a massive 83 training sessions throughout the year. Thank-you message from the RST First Responder group

The community cardiac first responder group from RST, would like to thank all those who contributed so generously to the churchgate collection in November. It is 8 years since we started this first responder group but we were stood down by the ambulance service due to covid, in March 2020.

We were chosen by the NAS as the first group to return to responding to cardiac calls as the national pilot site. After a successful return, the rest of the groups in the country restarted. Since the summer, our group has successfully resuscitated a man in cardiac arrest. This is a great achievement and makes it all worth while.

We will be going back to Syryne and Rathfeigh national school teaching the kids basic, age appropriate, resuscitation.

Any group in the area are welcome to basic training, as the more people who have knowledge of resuscitation the better the chance the patient has of survival. There are 3 public access defibrillators that our group has installed in the local area. Locals should know where they are and have an idea how to use them. Remember to call an ambulance if you suffer persistant chest, arms, neck or jaw pain.

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


