Please be very careful before providing personal information or payment details to any online websites. Have you ever noticed QR codes (the square barcodes) in public places which allow you to navigate quickly to a related website? It could be on a product ad, or at a pay and display parking machine, or more recently at electric car chargers. The idea is to make it simple for the customer to open a link to purchase a product, pay for parking, or pay for charging a car. A scam taking place in recent weeks involves criminals placing a customised QR Code sticker over the original code, therefore directing you to their cloned website. They then ask for your details and credit card number!

It's very easy to fall for that one when you are in a hurry and trying to pay for parking etc! If in doubt, go directly to the official website of the company providing the service, using your phone browser.

Night Sky March 2023

Phases of the Moon:

Full moon: 7th March (Worm Moon)

Last Quarter: 15th March, New Moon: 21st March, First Quarter: 29th March

Best Nights for Observations: 17th - 28th March 2023. **Sunrise**: 0713 am **Sunset** 1802 pm 1st March 2023

March 2023:

Jupiter: At the end of February and into March **Jupiter** will be setting at about 8 pm. **Uranus** is setting in the SW (need a telescope). **Mars** is still high in the SW. Venus: During March Venus becomes much more prominent in the SW after sunset.

At the end of February:

Arcturus is bright in the East, altitude of 25°. It is among the brightest of stars, shining with a soft orange light. It is located about 37 light years away and it became famous when its light was used to open the 1933 world fair in Chicago as the light had left the star at about the time of the previous Chicago Fair in 1893.

Regulus is in the SSE with an altitude of 45° and bearing of 154° and it is on the ecliptic (path of the Sun, Moon, planets across the night sky).

March: There is a conjunction of Jupiter and Venus at sunset on 1st March. As both of these planets are very bright it should make a great spectacle. But clear skies in SW will be needed as the conjunction is low in the sky with an altitude of only about 10°. As March continues **Venus** will gain altitude in the evening sky as Jupiter disappears over the horizon. There is also a waxing gibbous moon at this time. The moon is in Gemini with Castor and Pollux to the east of the moon.

Sirius is low in the southern sky (very bright) with **Orion** slightly more to the west. Mars is in the SW with altitude 50° and bearing 242°. The Plough is high in the NE sky and should be very clear. Vega, Deneb and Altair representing the Summer **Triangle** are becoming more prominent in the night sky with **Vega** reaching an altitude of 56° and bearing of 100° in the East by 5 am. They also mark the line of the Milky Way.

As the month progresses the star Spica, the luminary of Virgo, is rising in the evening sky. Spica can be easily found by following the curve of the Plough handle, through **Arcturus** and down to **Spica**. Although the star is 250 light years away it is still a first magnitude star as it is 1900 times more luminous than our Sun.

20th/21st March Equinox: Marks the sun crossing the earth's equator moving from South to North. It is the first day of spring. There is equal day and night. The earth does not quite make a full rotation in this time and is short by about 0.25 days. So over four years it is short 1 day, hence the leap year change of 1 day.

Perseverance and Ingenuity: The first sample depot has been established on another world (Mars). Confirmation that the rover dropped the 10th and final tube in an area designated as the drop area was received on January 29th 2023. This required precision planning and navigation to ensure that the tubes can be safely recovered in the future, even when covered by sand, by the ESA-NASA Mars Sample **Return Program** which aims to bring the Mars samples to earth for closer Study.

Galactic Calendar:



All objects in our solar system, including the earth, move in a spiral around the Sun. This is because the sun moves around the Milky Way and all objects in our Solar System are 'dragged along' by the great mass of our sun (as indicated above). More than 99% of the mass of our solar system is contained in our star, the Sun. The sun travels at 250 kms second and it takes, even at this speed, 225 million years to complete one rotation around the Milky Way. This is known as a Galactic Year. The last time the earth was in this exact position in the galaxy, dinosaurs had just begun to walk the earth. Since its birth the sun has orbited the galaxy 20 times. These are some of our timelines:

18 Galactic Years Ago (18x250 million years ago): Earth formed from a large rotating cloud of interstellar dust & gas called a Solar Nebula.

17 Galactic Years ago: The first oceans appeared after continuous rainfall for centuries.

16.8 GY ago: Life began on earth soon after the formation of the oceans.

12 GY ago: The first bacteria formed on

10 GY ago: Stable continents appeared on the planet's surface.

6.8 GY ago: Multicellular organisms appeared after billions of years.

2.4 GY ago: Cambrian Explosion - a sudden appearance of diverse forms of life in a relatively short period due the increase in oxygen due to photosynthesis.

2 GY ago: The first brain structure appeared in worms.

0.29 GY ago: Major extinction event when about 75% of life on earth was destroyed. The K-T Mass Extinction was caused by an extreme asteroid impact. Dinosaurs wiped out.

0.0008 GY ago: Homo Sapiens evolve. (We are the 'new kids on the block').

Starship:



Starship being stacked on the Super Heavy Booster at Boca Chica, Texas. The **Starship** is lifted onto the Booster using the '**chopstick**' arrangement. All parts of this rocket are reusable.

9th February 2023: Engineers conducted what's called a "static fire test", simultaneously igniting 31 out of 33 engines at the base of the vehicle's lower segment. The firing lasted only a few seconds, with everything clamped in place to prevent any movement.

On Twitter Elon Musk said that the team had turned off one engine before the test and that another engine stopped itself, leaving 31 engines firing overall. He added, it was "still enough engines to reach orbit". This is the final testing stage before lift-off. Starship itself has just 3 Raptor engines for use when in orbit. The lower section, the **Super Heavy** Booster, has to lift Starship and 100 tonnes of cargo into orbit.

Starship will become the most powerful operational rocket system in history when it makes its maiden flight.


Credit Union Quiz





Breath Deep

Now here's a trick that you probably haven't tried before: next time you forget something, try taking some deep breaths. It seems that inhaling stimulates our brain, creating electrical activity where emotions, memory and smells are processed.

In a recent American study, individuals were able to identify a face two seconds more quickly if they were breathing in through the nose, rather than breathing out. The study was carried out at Northwestern University in Chicago, and it may also explain why we breath rapidly when afraid.

"If you are in a panic state, you spend proportionally more time inhaling. Faster breathing could have a positive impact on brain function and result in faster response times."




