March Winds

One of my favourite proverbs as a child was: "March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb." Growing up on a farm the weather was a focal point of my parents lives and this weather saying from folklore while not based on any scientific evidence offered hope. March being such a fickle month it may bring weak but welcome sunshine, gale force winds or worse still a blanket of snow. I can still recall clearly when I worked in Donegal several years ago, being snowbound in Donegal town for three days at the end of March and with Easter only days away. No matter what March throws at us there is something infinitely restorative about this month as we enter meteorological Spring in contrast with the Gaelic calendar when Spring was regarded as starting on St. Brigid`s Day- February 1st.

Again, in childhood with my head full of fairy tales I used to wonder what would happen if night did not follow day or if Spring did not follow Winter. Yet, it is precisely the rhythm of the seasons that as an adult I find energising. Earlier this week I did what has now become almost a ritual for me every year, I checked in a sheltered part of the garden to see if the buds had appeared on the camelia bush, and I was not disappointed! While in other areas of the garden there are snowdrops and early narcissi in pale colours like a watercolour, the deep pink of the camelia buds resemble a glorious oil painting executed by nature itself.

It gladdened my heart to see at least 8 buds scattered throughout this hardy shrub and I thought of lines from the poet Margaret Elizabeth Sangster-

"Never yet was a springtime when the buds forgot to bloom."

This year Lent starts on Wednesday March 2nd. And I was thinking recently how growing up there was always some form of a prayer said in our house either before or after meals during Lent, no matter the cares of each day or how busy our lives were. It was not necessarily the traditional Catholic grace before meals, but it always served to remind us that there were others not just in Ireland but across the globe who were less fortunate than ourselves. We came to realize that everything which we took so much for granted including our very lives was a gift from the Divine Creator.

We are so blessed to live in this little country on the edge of Europe despite all its shortcomings and a growing sense of entitlement, among those who are already in the "haves" group as opposed to the "have-nots." Only yesterday, I spoke with a lovely young couple from a country bordering Russia, who decided ten years ago to make Ireland their home, along with their children. They are both hard-working individuals who contribute a lot to their local community. Yet to hear from them about the harsh regime and inherent injustices in their own country is heart -breaking. to say as kids "for Lent," but during Lent. I hope to be mindful at mealtimes and consider those around the world who are literally starving to death. And others who are so marginalised that they are forced to dig or rummage through filthy rubbish heaps infested by rats, while we in highly developed economies have a voracious appetite for consumerism. A quote from Mahatma Gandhi still resonates in our time.

"Live simply so that others may simply live."

And to conclude this piece, from Benedictus

(A Book of Blessings) by John O Donoghue:

Grace after Meals We end this meal with grace For the joy and nourishment of food The slowed time away from the world To come into presence with each other And sense the subtle lives behind our faces, The different colours of our voices, The edges of hunger we keep private, The circle of love that unites us To change the structures that make others hunger And that after such grace we might now go forth And impart dignity wherever we partake.

Night Sky March2022

Phases of the Moon:

New Moon: 2nd March, First Quarter: 10th March, Full Moon: 18th March (Worm Moon), Last Quarter: 25th March.

March Moon is commonly known as the Worm Moon. This is because of the earth worms that wriggle out of the ground as the earth thaws in March.

Early March:

This is a good time for observations as there is no moon visible. Sky is still dominated by Orion to the south. Look for the star Procyon altitude 50° and azimuth 134° (SE). At a distance of only 11.4 light years it is bright and radiates with the power of 7 suns. It is in fact two stars that orbit each other. With Sirius and Betelgeuse it forms an equilateral triangle in the sky (Winter Triangle).

Early March Morning:

at 5 am in the East the sky is dominated by the Milky Way with Antares to the right and Venus and Saturn rising to the left. Spica is to the SW, the only very bright star that marks the constellation Virgo. Arcturus (Leo) is setting in the West.

March 8th Evening sky:

lovely viewing of the Pleiades (seven sisters) Aldebaran (Taurus) and in between a crescent moon. Uranus is setting in the west. Above the red star Aldebaran is the very bright yellow/ white star of Capella.

March 12th -13th:

At about 10 pm the moon will pass through the constellation of Cancer just under Pollux and Castor and above Procyon and Alhena in the SW.

March:

For much of February and March Cassiopeia the Queen, descends from her throne in the Northwest after nightfall. The constellation has a distinctive **W** OR **M.** It is home to five bright stars that form the shape. If you can find the pole star it has the plough/Big Dipper on one side and Cassiopeia on the other side. It never sets in our latitude. A good pair of binoculars will allow you to explore this part of the Cosmos. Close by in Perseus there is a Double Cluster of stars still moving together from the primordial cloud of gas and dust that gave birth to them.

Milky Way Centre:

For much of the month the image below (enhanced) is the morning sky in the East just before sunrise. The dotted line is the ecliptic (the path of the sun and

planets across our sky). On the Milky Way, just above the horizon, is where the centre of our galaxy lies, with a supermassive black hole at its core. There is a red blotch just on the dotted line called the Lagoon Nebula. It is created by ionised gas (loses electrons, similar effect as the Northern Lights) caused by high energy ultraviolet photons emitted from nearby hot stars. Most stars within the Milky Way form from within this dusty disc. The MW is believed to be as old as the universe itself. In March April and May it is just above the eastern horizon. Best seen better in more southern Latitudes.

March:

Any evening in March you can of course view the great constellation of **Orion,** but it is moving more to the west in the evenings signifying the arrival of spring. We will lose it completely by the end of April into May signifying the arrival of summer.

You can see Venus and Mars rising, Mercury is just below the horizon and then sunrise.

This makes the DART mission this year to try and deflect a small asteroid very important and is the beginning of our asteroid earth defence.



Cosmic Microwave Background Radiation:



When images start to be available from JWST (James Webb Telescope) in a few months you will hear refences to the Cosmic Microwave Background Radiation. (as in the image below). This is the oldest image ever taken as it records the Epoch of Recombination (electrons, protons and neutrons could join together to form atoms, mainly Hydrogen and Helium). It is to all intents the image of the birth of the universe.

The universe went from the size of a hydrogen atom to about 1 light year across 370,000 years after the BB (Big Bang) and it was opaque. When it cooled to 3000 °C around this time everything changed. Protons, neutrons, electrons could now combine and photons (light) at last could escape out into space (first light). In 1948 Ralph Alpher & Robert Herman believed that the imprint of this first light should be detectable in the cosmos. They had no way of testing this theory.

Because the universe had expanded and cooled over billions of years the temperature and frequency of the CMB was calculated allowing for this expansion where temperature had cooled and the wavelength stretched. Using modern satellites many images of the CMB have been recorded, the latest of these being with the Planck Space Telescope as in the image above. The calculations, for example the temperature, was accurate to a high degree (prediction of -2.7° Kelvin was found to be -2.72548° Kelvin with a variation of 1 in a 100,000 in the temperature) and these calculations were a huge validation of the Big Bang theory. The variation in temperature (blue and red in image) represents differences in densities of the structure on both small and large scale shortly after the universe had formed. These variations are the reason for the stars, planets, galaxies we see today and constituted the scaffold on which the universe was built. The CMB has confirmed, to a high degree of accuracy, the theory of the state of the universe when it was in its infancy.

Asteroid 138971 (2001 CB 21):

On March 4th asteroid 138971 92001 CB 21) classed as a near earth asteroid will pass about 3 million miles away from us. Asteroids at this distance are constantly monitored by NASA in case of any change in their trajectory. It is classed as potentially dangerous. The asteroid is travelling at 43,236 kilometres/hr. This asteroid (giant rock) is on its way to the sun as the gravitational pull of the sun pulls it round the sun and slingshots it back out into space. It orbits the sun every 400 days. It crosses the orbits of the planets on its way to the sun. Its next close approach is in 2043 being slightly nearer that 2022. Its closest approach will be in 2148 at 2.2 million miles. At this moment in time there are no known asteroids on collision with the earth.



Jocelyn Bell Burnell

Dame Jocelyn Bell, as a graduate student at the University of Cambridge, discovered pulsars (rapidly spinning, dense remnants of dead stars).

Controversially, her doctoral supervisor and her collaborator received the 1974 Nobel Prize for Physics. In 2018 she used her \$3 million 'Breakthrough Prize in Fundamental Physics', to establish the Bell Burnell Graduate Scholarship Fund to encourage greater diversity in Physics.

She was celebrated recently, with many others, during **'International Day of Women and Girls in Science'.**

Skryne Community Alert

Burglaries continue to be a problem around the county since our last update. Cash and jewellery are common targets. What can be done to prevent our homes from being targeted?

- Report all suspicious activity in the area to Gardai. This includes those trespassing in fields with dogs, who may be casing out access to your home or the homes of your neighbours.
- Do not keep large sums of cash in your home.
- Take photos of jewellery of high monetary or sentimental value. It is a good idea to take photos of you wearing the jewellery as well as close up photos of the items. This can help prove ownership in the event of an insurance claim.
- Consider investing in a good safe, and have it secured to the floor or walls.
- Consider having high value goods and tools marked with your Eircode. This can deter theft and aid in recovery of stolen goods.
- Keep doors and windows locked when at home. Ensure your back door is locked before answering a call to the front door.
- If you have an alarm, please get in the habit of using it whether at home or away.
- Use timers to ensure your home is lit up if you are away during hours of darkness.

- Look out for your neighbours, especially if they are vulnerable or if you know they are away from home.
