

Natalya Coyle confirmed her spot in the Modern Pentathlon event, which will be one of the last disciplines at the Tokyo Olympics, at the European Championships in Bath in 2019.

Coyle finished ninth at London 2012 and sixth at Rio 2016 while she is also a twotime World Cup silver medallist and twotime World Cup Final winner in the mixed relay alongside Arthur Lanigan-O'Keeffe, who has declined his selection for the Games due to injury.

The 2016 Meath Sportsperson of the Year is a former member of Meath Hunt Pony Club, Coyle started competing in international modern pentathlon aged 16, having taken up horse riding before being introduced to the other disciplines.

"It is always special going to the Olympics, and with this being my third Games, I am still really excited to compete," said Coyle after her selection was confirmed.

Modern Pentathlon is based on a variation of the military aspect of the ancient pentathlon, and focuses on the skills required by soldiers in the late 19th century. Athletes compete in swimming,

show jumping (on an unknown horse), fencing, and Laser Run (combined running and shooting).

In Tokyo the competition takes place in two different venues, Musashino Forest Sport Plaza for the fencing and Tokyo Stadium for the remainder of the competition.

Team Ireland Modern Pentathlon Performance Director, Martina McCarthy is proud of Coyle's achievement in making her third successive games.

Team Ireland now consists of 45 officially selected athletes, with 98 athletes spots confirmed. The final team announcement is scheduled for the beginning of July.

The Olympic Games in Tokyo will run from the 23rd July to 8th August 2021, with Modern Pentathlon running between 5th and 6th August.

The Schools Collection, 1937-1939

National Folklore Collection

Between 1937 and 1939, more than 50,000 children from over 5,000 schools nationwide, interviewed their parents, grandparents and neighbours, and recorded folklore, history and local tradition in their copybooks. Back in the days when the children would normally have been given essays to write in both English and Irish at the weekends, this task was a welcome break! Only a few children from each school were selected. Reading through them now, one of the things that strikes you is their beautiful handwriting. Perhaps this was part of the selection process!

Over the last few years, the collection has been digitised and made available through the Duchas website. Included are the full collections from our two local schools in Skryne and Rathfeigh.

Each month we will publish an excerpt from the collections. Starting this month, we have some local history researched by Patty Mitchell, Waterside, Rathfeigh, and John Lynch, Dorea, Rathfeigh, both pupils of Rathfeigh School. Their teacher was Mrs Rose Madden.

Gardening really is good for you

ccording to a recent study conducted by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) and two universities, people who garden every day have wellbeing scores 6.6 per cent higher, and stress levels 4.2 per cent lower than those who do not garden at all. Dr Lauriane Chalmin-Pui, RHS well-being fellow and lead author says, "The evidence overwhelmingly suggests that the more frequently you garden, the greater the health benefits. "In fact, gardening every day has the same positive impact on your well-being as undertaking regular, vigorous exercise like cycling or running. "Gardening is like effortless exercise: it doesn't feel as strenuous as going to the gym, but we can expend similar amounts of energy."

What does your lawn say about you?

Perfectly mown lawn may look beautiful, but it is also a sign of male control. So says Monty Don, the Gardeners' World presenter. He is wary of what he calls the 'male obsession' to achieve a closely cut lawn which is of pure and perfect grass, without any other plants in it at all. Monty Don calls such an attitude to gardening "controlling rather than embracing," and reckons it is based on a desire to get just one more "aspect of life under control".

Instead, Don urges that at least part of our lawns should be encouraged to become wildflower meadows, which are much better for the environment. He explains: "Cutting grass burns fossil fuel, makes a filthy noise and is about the most injurious thing you can do to wildlife. Whereas, simply letting grass grow ... is probably the single most effective thing you can do in any garden of any size, to encourage, particularly, insect life, but also small mammals, invertebrates and reptiles."

Home alone, wanting a gnome

o you yearn for a garden gnome? You are not the only one. Since last year's lockdown, garden centres have been reporting a 'massive upswing' in ornament sales, due to people being forced to spend more time in their gardens. Gnomes top the list of most-wanted ornaments, with a near 100 per cent increase in sales over the past two years. There was even a gnome crisis a while back, when the Suez Canal got jammed, and thousands of gnomes on their way to gardens could not get through.

In praise of the Afternoon Nap

A short nap in the afternoon improves your memory and keeps your brain more agile. People who nap tend to speak more fluently, have greater mental agility, and remember things better than those who do not break up their day with sleep. Even a five-minute nap can offer your brain a chance to down-time and replenish itself, so that it is 'good to go' again. If you want longer than five minutes, try to stop at 40 minutes, before you enter the deepest stage of sleep. If you do carry on, sleep for two hours, which is a full sleep-cycle. The study was published in the British Medical Journal.

Chocolate – food of the gods!

The botanical name for the cocoa bean is Theobroma – which means 'food of the gods.' Chocolate makes us feel better. The chemicals it contains trigger the release of endorphins similar to those we naturally produce when we fall in love.

But nutritionists warn against using chocolate as a pick-meup, especially in the evening. Chocolate eaten before bedtime can cause blood glucose levels to plummet during the night, which will disrupt your sleep. Chocolate eaten in quantity every day can lead to mood and energy swings, weight gain and poor immunity. If you have mad cravings for it, you could have a problem with blood sugar, or a deficiency in magnesium, copper, zinc or iron. But occasional consumption of cocoa can provide medical benefits. Chocolate containing



60 per cent or more cocoa solids is rich in essential trace elements and nutrients such as iron, calcium and potassium, and many vitamins. Cocoa is also the highest natural source of magnesium. Good as all this may be – most of us enjoy chocolate simply because of its high sugar and caffeine content. Chocolate simply gives you an instant sugar hit, providing a sudden burst in energy, unfortunately followed by a slump and the desire for another sugar-fix.

Movie Review

This time we're going to look at horror, a staple of the movie night with friends and a genre that has brought many to resort to hiding behind their hands. Here are my top three, must-see horror movies;



The Exorcist (1973)

Often credited as the scariest movie ever made, what audiences remember from The Exorcist is often the terrifying moments such as the headspin and the spider-walk scenes, but what people forget is the almost Shakespearean story underneath about a priest wrestling with his faith following the death of his mother. The Exorcist brings together a terrific director, stellar performances from Jason Miller, Ellen Burstyn and Linda Blair, a brilliant script and masters of lighting, sound and special effects, to create a thoroughly entertaining, deeply emotional and always terrifying horror classic.



Following his 1978 horror masterpiece Halloween (which you should also check out), this film confirmed director John Carpenter as a master of the genre. Featuring a crew of scientists in an Antarctic research base, the film follows them as an alien infiltrates their numbers, which can take the form of any one of them. Featuring brilliantly calculated direction, great performances, masterful creature effects and iconic moments such as the blood test and the defibrillator scenes, The Thing is a tense, claustrophobic and scary thrill ride from start to finish.





Psycho (1960)

Psycho's shower scene is what most people associate it with, but the rest of the film is just as thrilling and scary. What starts off as a crime caper takes a quick left turn into insanity, as Marion Crane stops off at the Bates Motel. Pushing the limits of what could be shown on screen at the time, Alfred Hitchcock created his masterpiece with Psycho, a disturbing, thrilling and scary classic.

If you're still brave enough, you should definitely check out Poltergeist, Alien, The Shining, Halloween, Jaws, Rosemary's Baby and The Silence of the Lambs.

Night Sky July 2021

Sunrise: 5am

Full Moon: 24th July

Moon:

July 1st - Last Quarter Moon (half visible moon) July 10th – New Moon (no moon visible) July 17th – First Quarter (half-moon visible)

Sunset: 10 pm


Astronomical noon: 1:30 pm

July 24th – Full Moon July 31st – Last Quarter (half-moon visible)

Best viewing of the moon is during its phases as the shadow cast reveals the details of the craters

July Sky:


Because in mid-summer the days are long and nights are not so dark. It is not ideal for observations. However, some stars dominate during the summer nights, about 10 pm, namely Vega (nearly overhead in the SE, altitude 70 °), **Altair** (directly below it, altitude 35°) and **Deneb** in the East, (altitude 55°) and form what is know as the **Summer** Triangle. Deneb and Vega never set, they are circumpolar. They also mark the position of the Milky Way in the sky. **Deneb** marks the constellation of Cygnus, the Swan, with its outstretched neck going towards the star Albireo, see below. The moon will have set so better for observations (unless you want to observe the moon).



The Summer Triangle: Deneb, Vega and Altair are clearly visible in the night sky.

July 15th:

- The moon is waxing crescent in the SW, so good for observations.
- Antares, in Scorpio, a brilliant jewel set at the heart of Scorpius, is rising from the SE.
- Venus is setting in the West after the Sun.
- Spica, the luminary of Virgo, is prominent to the southeast, altitude 15°. Spica can easily be found by following the curve of the handle of the Big Dipper (Plough) down through Arcturus and then on down to Spica.
- Cassiopeia is in the northwest sky with its distinct **W** shape (see below). A supernova was recorded in Cassiopeia by the great Dutch astronomer Tycho Brahe in 1573 as a new star.



This **W** shape is very clear in the sky and as you can see, it leads us to the Open Star Clusters of M52 (Messier objects catalogued by the French astronomer Charles Messier) and NGC663 (New General Catalogue number) on each side of the W.

Close to Cassiopeia is the galaxy of **Andromeda**. In early July you will have to wait until about 1 am for Andromeda to gain sufficient altitude for observation. Several minor galaxies lie closer to the Milky Way than Andromeda but this is the closet **Large Spiral Galaxy** to us and the brightest galaxy in this sky. So if you want to study galaxies this is the one. In the night sky on 10thJuly it has an azimuth 50° and an altitude of 23°, climbing higher in the sky during the night.

By July 25th at 10 pm the following planets will have risen in the East, Saturn, Jupiter, Neptune and Uranus, but you will have a full moon to contend with at this stage.

Betelgeuse:

RTE reported on 20th June on the work of an Irish PHd student who has studied the dimming of the star Betelgeuse as part of an international research team studying the star. It is in the constellation of Orion, very visible to the naked eye, and is a Red Giant Star. It is at the end of its life and is due to go supernova in the next few thousand years, an event that would be spectacular for those on the earth, but still at a safe distance. The team used the VLT (Very Large Telescope) in Chile to image the star. It clearly showed that the dimming was caused by a giant dust cloud resulting in a drop in temperature on the stars surface as measured from the earth. The VLT is situated in the Atacama dessert in Chile operated by ESO (European Space Agency). Four eight metre telescopes operate together giving and incredible angular resolution of 0.002 arcseconds. The VLT telescope directly imaged the first exoplanet, the tracking of individual stars moving around the black hole at the center of the Milky Way. Betelgeuse is in the sky during July so it is not visible.

Venus:

NASA has announced a \$500 million per mission (2 missions) to Venus in 2028-2030 timeframe. These missions will study the composition of Venus's atmosphere and will try and determine whether the planet had oceans. The mission will have a **descent sphere** that will plunge through the planet's thick atmosphere to try to understand why Venus's atmosphere is a runaway hothouse compared to the earth's atmosphere including the effect of volcanoes, etc. on the surface This information is vital in understanding our own planet. The probe will only last about 20 mins after arrival on the surface due to Venus's corrosive atmosphere.

China's Space Station:

Having recently set up its own space station China launched three astronauts into orbit to begin occupation of the Tianhe module located 380 Kms above the earth. They will bring the module into service and start testing new technologies.

Blue Origin: Jeff Bezos, the founder and CEO of Amazon, and his brother will join the person who bid €28 million in an online auction for a seat on 'Blue Origin'. The winning bidder will fly to space on **Blue Shepard's** first human flight and will be joined by Jeff Bezos and his brother Mark. The seat money will go to **Club** for the Future, set up to inspire future generations to invent the future in space.

SpaceX: Construction of the Super Heavy Booster for Starship is well under way with first test flight planned, at the moment, for July. The plan is that the Starship duo will lift off from Boca Chica with the first stage coming back 6 minutes later in the Gulf of Mexico. The upper stage will continue to earth orbit and will later splashdown about 100 km off the northwest coast of Hawaiian island of Kauai. Development at SpaceX is moving at an incredible pace. These are all unmanned test flights.

Irish Astronomers:

James Hamilton (Irish Cleric):

He was the son of Mary Giradot, from a Huguenot family (French Calvinist Protestant), and Colonel Gustavus Hamilton of Summerseat, Co. Meath. He graduated from Trinity in 1765 in astronomy and science.

He was made rector of Kildress, Co. Armagh in 1776. He set up an observatory in Cookstown, Co. Tyrone and came to the attention of the Astronomer Royal. In 1790 he was appointed astronomer and keeper of the new Armagh Observatory which he helped to set up.

He worked with other astronomers and observatories, notably **Dunsink Observatory** in Dublin. He died in 1815. Armagh astronomers today are researching Solar-System Astronomy, Solar Physics, Stella and Galactic Astrophysics and Solar Earth relationships.

European Union:

A new EU space programme has been officially launched. It will see the EU deepen investments in satellitenavigation, Earth conservation, space situation awareness and secure communications among other activities. Euspa (European Agency for the Space Programme) will examine the relationship between EU and ESA (European Space Agency) particularly in the light of countries such as United Kingdom being members of ESA but not a member of EU.

This will cover such areas as investment and intellectual property rights. The EU is also aware that 'space is going through a massive transformation and rapid industrialisation all around the world. We must adapt to fast moving developments and anticipate new ones'.

The Worst Time Of Our Lives

In 1976, after only seventeen years of marriage, George died of a massive heart attack at the age of forty-six, he was buried on our seventeenth Wedding Anniversary, a big strong man who was never a day sick in all the time I knew him.

I just thought the whole world had ended. There are no words to describe what I felt at that time, and for a long time after. I know, beyond the shadow of a doubt, that the only reason I didn't fall apart and disintegrate, was the fact that I had two kids,

sixteen and fourteen and a half, to finish rearing.

They were both in Secondary school, and one thing I will always be grateful for, is the fact that I did not have to get a job immediately, so I was able to be there with the dinner ready, and the house warm when they came home, as I knew they too were suffering terribly. One night in bed about a month or six weeks after George died, I felt so awful that I really did think that I too, was going to die. I remember the dying didn't bother me that much, but the thought of leaving them on their own at this age did. So I made a "deal" with God, that if HE would leave me with them until Noel (the youngest) was twenty-two, then I would happily "go". Mind you, He must have forgotten all about me, because nearly twenty years later I'm still here.

Strangely enough, I never felt as close to God (since or before) as I did at that time, and this helped enormously, as He did "answer" when I "called" on the days when I was at the bottom of the pit.

I do know that some people "fall out" with God when sudden and unexpected death hits their family, and I think it must be even harder to cope when this happens.

I will never, ever forget the sympathy, help, and support of family, friends, and neighbours at that time.


MORE PRESS OPTIMISM

Use of Salt

- A pinch of salt added to the white of egg or cream which requires whipping will hasten stiffening.
- Cooking utensils which have been used for onions can be cleaned by rubbing with salt.
- Sprinkled at the bottom of the oven, or on the shelf under the cake tin, salt will prevent the cakes from burning.
- When anything has been spilt on the above, a handful of salt will remove any unpleasant odour.
- A paste made of salt, alum and boiling water can be used to fill up cracks in floors or furniture.
- If a new toothbrush is soaked in hot salt water before being used it will last twice as long.
- Salt is still an excellent gargle.
- If salt is added to the outer pan of a double boiler greater heat is produced, as brine boils 14 degrees higher than water.
- Eggs packed in salt will keep for a long time.
- French or scarlet runner beans can be kept in salt for winter use.
- Salt added to the rinsing water will set the colour in coloured fabrics.
- Dry salt is an excellent dry cleaning medium.
- A bag of hot salt makes an excellent foot warmer or poultice.

Lemon

- A piece of lemon peel boiled with tea cloths and towels will bleach them most effectively
- Lemon ans salt will remove fresh ink stains from any material
- Lemon juice as an ingredient of salad dressing , is both more healthy and more delicate in flavor than vinegar
- Half a lemon dipped in salt and rubbed on a chilblain is a quick cure. The same remedy is effectual for sore feet.
- If a sour sponge is rubbed well with a fresh lemon and afterwards well rinsed in warm water, it will become sweet.
- Lemon juice will allay the irritation of gnat bites.
- Half a teaspoonful of lemon juice in a glassful of hot water makes an excellent tooth wash.
- Lemon will remove stains from the hands and whiten the skon
- Quarter of a lemon in which four cloves have been inserted will give an excellent flavor to soup.
- Lemon juice and whiting will remove stains from brass.

Paraffin

- A cloth damped with paraffin , rolled up tightly and left for 24 hours can then be used—
- To clean doors, casings, china, furniture, bedsteads, etc.
- Linoleums, painted floors, stairs and bannisters.
- To clean windows and mirrors.
- To clean grates and and gas stoves.
- It is excellent for removing grease and if used regularly, grate polish will only be necessary very occasionally.
- The paraffin cloth absorbs all dust , leaving no streaky marks, and is thus a great aid to housework.
- Modern cooking and heating paraffin stoves are most efficient, and have no unpleasant odour.
- A wad of cotton wool soaked in paraffin and placed inside the case of a grandfather clock will effectively clean it. The dust collects on the pad of wool, which can be removed after a few days.

Newspaper

- As a fire lighter it is most effective , if rolled and twisted.
- A pad of newspaper cut to uniform size should be kept near the sink, and a piece torn off to wipe knives and silver and clean plates before they are put into the washing up water.
- Newspaper is an excellent protection and covering for the table, etc, when dirty work is taking place.
- There is no better agent for polishing windows and mirrors than a pad of newspaper- the printers ink possesses special polishing qualities.

I hope the above enlightens all and provides good tips for the 21st century carried from the last one.









The Station

It was the crack of dawn and the first orange flames of the sun were visible above the miraged horizon. After another restless and uncomfortable night sleeping on the hard leather in my car, I resumed my journey down the same dead-straight road with my only companions being the tumbleweeds which continued to populate the roadside.

I was doing a *'Forrest Gump'* of America, from East to West, in my silver 1967 Ford Mustang, which I had meticulously restored. Even with these modernisations there were two major discomforts with the car: extremely uneconomical on petrol and lack of power steering. The latter was compounded with the fact that I previously injured my shoulder muscles in a fight I had with an ancient oak tree when I was younger. I was immensely glad of the deserted roads as it was taking my brain a very long time to become accustomed to this flipped-over side driving. My tall stature fit comfortably into the elongated cockpit of the Mustang.

Even with my four three-gallon fuel cans, safely cocooned in the boot, I still fell short of the next petrol station. This was how I came to be pushing the Mustang the remaining kilometre into the '*The Groom Station*'. Now, the power steering seemed like child's play.

All along the road, numerous old advertising signs littered the road making it virtually impossible to see the barren multi-toned desert landscape. The weather-worn edges and significantly faded paint along with the front told me they were from the latter half of the previous century. They all seemed to have a common thread: save time. Some of the more memorable ones included:

Get Going Goods Rapid Repairs Fast-Forward Food

'The Groom Station' itself was a testament to a forgotten era. It was like someone had plucked it from the 1960s and placed it beside the road. The canopy was bounded by the iconic neon lights of that decade which contrasted with the brown sand-worn exterior. The only outside fitting apart from the pumps was a battered and neglected old phone box with 'TELE-' being the only painted letters remaining visible and legible. This dilapidated and rundown state extended to the surviving exterior. I wished now I had checked to see if it was still connected to the outside world.

Having pushed my shoulders to within a few inches of their lives, I finally positioned the Mustang beside the lone oldfashioned pump. Despite the entire station being covered in a dredge of sand, the pump appeared to only have rolled off the production line yesterday. After rummaging my bony fingers through my blue and yellow Bermuda short's deep pockets, I emerged with my last fifty dollars.

This would have normally got me the car and two cans full, but due to the surprisingly low price per gallon, I succeeded in filling the car and all four cans to the brim. Only after depositing them safely in the expanded booth of the car, did the large puddle of dark, light-dispersing oil against the pale worn concrete become apparent to me.

I then decided the pay for the petrol. On my way over to the shop entrance, in the shadow of the canopy, I clearly saw the silhouette of an attendant behind the counter. The silhouette was intermittent as the old filament bulb which illuminated the interior was on its last legs. This combined with the thick obscuring grime on the windows produced an image akin to the camera of the Station's heyday.

As I pulled open the creaking and glass-paned manual door using the long, thin and rusted handle, the bulb seemed to get a new lease on life. The attendant appeared to have vanished and so I waited.

Waited. Waited. Waited.

During this time, the green analogue and multi-buttoned cash register seemed to have become invigorated with the same magic that affected the bulb. Exactly on every minute it went '*ding*' and the total increased by a dollar. Thirty-nine dollars were now displayed.

There was light seeping out underneath and through the cracks in the door leading into what I believed to be the storage room behind the counter. The silhouette appeared to be moving around that room. It was obvious from the darkened cracks that the silhouette was quite small and exceedingly thin. This dance of light and darkness lasted for a few minutes and then suddenly stopped. Throughout all of this, the lack of any audible associated sounds made the spectacle that much more sinister and surprising.

Frustration and slight anxiety prompted me to exit. As soon as my two feet crunched sand again, the lights resumed their random pattern of flickering alongside the attendant returning to his position behind the counter. I repeated entering and exiting multiple times, but this strange phenomenon persisted. While inside, the shop was devoid of any life. But, when viewed from the outside the skeleton-thin, child-height attendant in silhouette could be seen. Thirst and hunger overruled my fears and I entered for one last time. A sparkling-clean water cooler, which sat in the corner was my first destination. I forcefully grabbed one of the milk white cups and placed it in the dispenser beneath. I turned the tap, heard the gurgling sound, saw the water level reduce but yet my cup remained as dry as the desert outside.

After my shock and bewilderment wore off, I made my way across the squeaky with polish floor to the fridges. With my hand noticing no decrease in temperature, I was surprised when I felt the icy cold glass bottles of Dr.Pepper. The same curious spectacle occurred with the freezer: a temperature of 101° F/38°C and frozen food. My eye then turned to a mound of pre-wrapped *Twinkies* and I shot over to them. Due to the previous aberrations, my instinct told me to look at the best before date: June 8th1984. The slice of apple pie digesting in my stomach would have to do for another few hours.

As I was passing by the now familiar and eerie counter, two more signs both frightened and perplexed me. The first was as well-groomed and healthy bonsai tree living in soil that was as much sand as that outside. The second was the open yellow-paged credit book. The last entry read:

June '47 60 yards of Aluminium Foil \$47.93 William Brazel

That was the straw that broke the camel's back. With my last remaining grey hairs plastered to my head, I shrunk back to my car and my phone. A black, blank screen stared up at me. When I resurrected it, my dreaded terror popped on the screen:

NO SIGNAL

I had to prove that I still possessed sanity: I needed proof. With

my phone switched to camera mode, I tried in vain to take a landscape shot of the petrol station. The button would press and shutter click, but no image would find its way to the library. Never again would I be fooled into purchasing an Android.

It was then that I heard a noise similar to an aluminium bin falling from a height at the back of the garage. At this point, a battle raged in my mind between curiosity on one hand and fear on the other. After several uneasy minutes, the latter got the upper hand.

In the manner of a little frightened cat, my legs carried me to the surprisingly large yard at the rear. The first thing that struck me was the unexplainable façade: the dreary grey stone bunker was in complete contrast to the sand-blasted metal front. Opposite this newfound fortification, was the unusual sight of numerous Ford cars chronologically ordered from the 1940s to the present with the notable exception of a 1967 Ford Mustang.

However, it was the BSA military generator, attached to the smooth exterior wall, that caused me the most concern. As I stood there, it would periodically emit a visible orange spark. At that, I finally threw in the towel. I'd had enough. That was the last straw.
