David Hegarty from Oberstown recently (last month) climbed the Aconcogua mountain Argentina.

Aconcagua is a mountain in the Principal Cordillera of the Andes mountain range, in Mendoza Province, Argentina. It is the highest mountain in the Americas, the highest outside Asia, and the highest in the Southern Hemisphere with a summit elevation of 6,961 metres. This is a series of climbs that he has completed and this one was also a fundraiser for Irish Cancer Society.

Road to Aconcagua

In order to support the vital work that the **Irish Cancer Society** are delivering to those in need, in December 2022 I took on the challenge of climbing the world's tallest mountain outside of the Himalayas, Aconcagua over an expedition period of 19 days. On the mountain I experienced many challenges (lack of oxygen due to elevation, extreme weather systems and high winds, temperatures of -20oc routinely being experienced at night and -30oc at the summit, overall duration and need to carry all your food and equipment with you from base camp) both physical and mental which I needed to overcome, but was all worth it by helping those who are at the front line of supporting our loved ones in their time of need.

I can easily say that those two weeks were some of the most challenging of my life. Instant thoughts of taking on something like this are drawn to the physical demands, but more importantly the mountain takes a mental toll on you as the days pass by and energy is consumed.



Albeit not a technical mountain, the demands on both body and mind at nearly 7000m above sea level put you in a rarefied state. Your thoughts feel like they are not your own. Your body reacts to situations like it's not your own. All in all, a very challenging place to try to exist in for a prolonged period of time. Nights were long and cold, with high wind speeds of up to 100 kph gusts rattling the tent nightly meant that sleep was hard to come by at the high camps. It is hard to think of rainbows and puppy dogs as you lay in your sleeping bag at ~ -10degC staring into the darkness that is both your tent, and also your mind. But just as dawn follows night, when the suns rays eventually creep over the horizon, they bring with them not only warmth to your body, but also to your mind and spirit. Every day at 6am I made sure I was out there soaking in every bit of it, basking in not only the dawn of a new day, but also the optimism and opportunity that came with it. The alignment between this physical daily cycle and the struggles a lot of us go through on a daily basis was so poignant to me, no matter how dark things are, there will be bright times ahead.

We had a single day summit weather window which ended up being on the night of the 22nd. 7 of our expedition team of 8 made the departure from Camp 3 that morning at 5am, and by 2pm only two people eventually made it to the summit, and unfortunately I have to report that I wasn't one of them.

We were down to 3 climbers at 6800m with only 162m left to climb when our guide started to notice my symptoms of ataxia (high altitude related dizziness etc). We took a break and I ate some sugars and hydrated and continued onward for another period as he knew how much this summit meant to me. Sadly the break didn't do too much to resurrect my stability so at the 6900m point, or roughly an hour from the summit, my bid to claim it was over.

My fantastic climbing partners agreed to take my Irish Cancer Society t shirt the remainder of the way resulting in the image you see below, with the second image showing a downtrodden selfie of where I remained and waited for them to come back so we could descend together.

It took sometime but after a couple of days I now look back and not feel failure for missing out on the final 1% of the journey. The 99% that made up the rest of the expedition was filled with memories, challenges and experiences that I will carry with me forever. I have attached a small number of photos taken, but they will only show a tiny sample size of the wonder that is Aconcagua.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who have supported me through this challenge, both via messages and reactions to posts, it really helped seeing the positive response to one man's effort. To have raised €10,000 that all goes directly to the ICS has blown away my expectations, I set a high bar with no really aspiration that I would actually achieve it, so truly grateful for all that have donated so far.

Old churches. In older times showne parish was divided into the following divisions, Skryne, Jara, Rathfey Frevet, Macetown, Templehieran and Lismullen. The patron saints of each are: of shryne St. bolumcille; of Lara St. Patrick; of Rathfeigh the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin; of Frevet St. Patrick; of Macetown St. Richolas; of Templehieran St Kieran and of Lismullen the Holy Trinity The chapel of Rathfeigh in the reign of Queen Anne was a mud wall thatched house in the valley of Rathfeigh, the next at Macetown, the third erection at Loughenstown, and the fourt in a hind of commono in Rathfeigh. The last which was built in the year 1779. Annie Fitzeimons, greenpark, Dunshaughlin.

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Night Sky February 2023

Phases of the Moon:

Full moon: 5th February, **Last Quarter:** 13th February, **New Moon:** 20th February, **First Quarter:** 27th February. **Best nights for observations 15th - 28th February 2023. Sunrise:** 0810 am **Sunset** 1707 pm 1st February 2023

Comet C/2022 E3:

A comet not seen for 50,000 years has returned. The last time it visited the earth it would have been seen by Neanderthals or Homo Sapiens. Comet C/2022 E3 is composed primarily of frozen gases, dust and ice that are heated by the comets approach to the sun causing it to glow. This is known as the **Coma.**

It will be difficult to see but, on its way back from the sun, it will become brighter with its closest approach to the earth (perigee) on evening of 1st **February** at a distance of over 40 million kilometres. On the evening of 26th/27th **January** it passes a few degrees east of the bowl of the Big Dipper (The Plough). By February 5th it will pass a few degrees to the west of the star **Capella**. Unfortunately, at this stage we have a full moon rising in the East and I think this might make it extremely difficult to see the comet. Best option 26th/27th/28th January. Magnitude at this time is +5. So, you need a dark site, telescope or binoculars. January 26th /27th: Dubhe, the last star on the Big Dippers bowl, has a bearing 40°,

altitude 42° in the NE. There is only a crescent moon in the SW at this time, so reasonably good visibility.

February 1st:

Comets closest approach to the earth.

February 5th:

The comet passes a few degrees to the west of the star **Capella**

The February night sky at this time is the best in the year. Orion is to the south with Sirius (brightest star in the sky), Betelgeuse (that could go supernova at any time soon), Rigel, Orion Nebula Star Nursery, and to the NE the constellation of Taurus with Aldebaran, Hyades Star Cluster with the planet Mars. Around 10 pm Mars is nearly overhead, noted by its red colour. You will notice close by a fainter reddish star, Aldebaran at the end of the V-shape, marking the end of the horns of the bull in Taurus. Higher to the left is the constellation of Auriga where you will find the very bright star Capella.

We are beginning to lose Jupiter in the SW as February continues.


February 9th/10th:

The moon is below the horizon in the eastern sky so much better viewing conditions. Great views of the Plough (Big Dipper) in the NE and by following the last two stars of the bowl you come to Polaris. This star marks the position of the Little Dipper (Ursa **Minor**) as well as the position of the **Celestial Pole.** You can see Mars (nearly overhead at 10 pm, reddish) you can also find to the right, the small group of bright stars known as 'The Pleiades' (The Seven Sisters), Alcyone, Asterope, Celaeno, Elactra, Maia, Merope and Taygeta. They are veiled in a misty nebulosity that inspired Alfred Lord Tennyson to write "Many a night I saw Pleiades, rising through the mellow shade, Glitter like a swarm of fireflies, tangled in a silver braid". Amazing through binoculars.

Plans for 2023:

- Starship; We await the orbital launch of Starship in Q1 of 2023. If successful it will be the largest spacecraft to make it to orbit.
 With its ability to carry more mass, more options will open up for space exploration. NASA has chosen the upper stage of this rocket for its lander vehicle for Artemis.
- April 2023; ESA (European Space Agency) will launch a mission called 'JUICE' (Jupiter Icy Moons Explorer). Scheduled to arrive
 in 2031, the spacecraft will study Ganymede, Callisto and Europa, all of which are thought to harbour oceans and possible
 life forms. This craft has ice penetrating radar.
- Russia is now planning to launch its Luna 25 lander in 2023 and hoping to land near the Boguslawsky crater on the moon's south pole region.
- The **Osiris-Rex Mission** launched in 2016 to take samples from the asteroid **Bennu** is due back with samples in September 2023, a seven year mission.
- **October 2023**: NASA will launch **'Psyche'** to the asteroid called **'Psyche**'. Asteroids are normally made of rock. This one is made of iron, probably the core of a planet from the early stages of the beginning of the Solar System.
- Late 2023: ESA will launch the Euclid Telescope (Named after the father of Geometry). This launch has been switched from a Russian rocket to a Falcon 9, SpaceX Rocket, following Russia's invasion of the Ukraine. The telescope will probe dark matter and dark energy by observing billions of galaxies over a third of the sky.
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Late 2023: Amazon plans to send up its first satellite to rival SpaceX – Starlink (Global Internet Service). It is the beginning of a 3,000 satellite orbiting communications network.



This is the United Kingdom's first orbital space launch from UK soil. Spaceport Cornwall is a new UK spaceport, opened in September 2022. The rocket was launched from a modified Virgin Boeing 747 as above.

At just before midnight on 9th January 'Cosmic Girl' a modified Boeing 747 left Cornwall Spaceport to launch it rocket 'LauncherOne' into orbit with a payload of nine satellites (all the size of shoe boxes). It was waved off by its enthusiastic ground staff with high hopes for a new beginning for UK rocket launches. Unfortunately, after failing to reach orbit the rocket fell back to earth and its fiery re-entry was witnessed from Lanzarote in the Canary Islands. Considering that the previous four test runs had been successful this was a

bitter pill to swallow for Richard Branson and Virgin. Someone once said that 'space is difficult' and we see that with nearly all entries into this sector of transport. This is also the reason why SpaceX are taking so long to put their new **Starship** into orbit as a catastrophic failure is not really a financial option (future NASA contracts are at stake).

Perseverance and Ingenuity:

Perseverance continues to drill rock samples on Mars. Its companion the helicopter Ingenuity continues to fly (now 30 flights) to help Perseverance chose the best track in the crater. The rover is in the heart of the delta now and has drilled 14 rock samples and dropped them for pick up. The plan is for Perseverance to deliver the samples to a NASA/ ESA lander (due to launch 2027) that will have a built in rocket which will launch the material to orbit and these will be snagged by an ESA provided orbiter for return to the earth.

ELF (Extremely Large Telescope):

Construction of the ELT (Extremely Large Telescope) continues atop of Cerro Amazones in Chile. The main mirror will measure 39-metres across, having 798 adjustable segments. The previous VLT (Very Large Telescope) has a main mirror of 8.6 metres. Its science will consist of the following:

- Look for Earth like planets
- Probe the nature of Dark Matter and Dark Energy.
- Study stars in our galaxy and beyond
- Study Black Holes
- Study the evolution of distant Galaxies back to 380,000 years after the Big Bang



The laser beams (in the photograph) measure the distortion in the atmosphere before light enters the telescope and this is automatically corrected by computers giving the astronomer a clear picture. This telescope, when completed, will be able to collect 100 million times more light than the human eye. Its total mass will be 3000 tonnes.

An Auspicious Date from History and the New Year

The mercury was far below zero and snow had fallen on 20th January 1961 as the 35th president of the USA was inaugurated. His name was John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

Recently, while searching for some old family photos among the many boxes stored in the attic, I came across some press cuttings from that time. Many readers who were children of the sixties and early seventies, will recall that it was not uncommon at that time to see a framed photograph of JFK hanging on the wall of the so-called parlour or "good room." It was usually placed alongside a framed photo of the incumbent pope of that period: Pope Paul VI (His papacy lasted from June 1963 - August 1978).

It was reported that approximately one million people turned up in Washington DC in the hope of catching a fleeting glimpse of JFK and his wife, the glamorous Jacqueline Kennedy. Attendees at the inauguration witnessed the proceedings commence with prayers from Cardinal Cushing followed by the US anthem (The Star Spangled Banner) sung by the famous opera singer Marian Anderson.

The gifted poet, Robert Frost recited his poem entitled The Gift Outright,

Then Lyndon Baines Johnson was sworn in as vice-president of the USA followed by JFK as president, under the eagle eye of Chief Justice Earl Warren. While the outgoing President Dwight Eisenhower alongside his Vice President Nixon and former President Trumann watched.

Kennedy`s inaugural speech is now one of the most famous from history and his line "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country," has been quoted countless times ever since.

An inauguration luncheon (more like a gargantuan feast from the time of Henry V111) was held at the United States Senate Restaurant, Washington. It included among it`s many courses prime rib beef from Texas and the finest New England lobster.


Afterwards, a parade took place along Pennsylvania Avenue of drill teams, military units, and bands, watched by thousands of onlookers, despite the freezing conditions. A Pershing medium -range ballistic missile , a Buffalo Bill character riding a buffalo and a replica of a navy PT boat were also included – the latter was similar to a boat that Kennedy had commanded during WW11 in the pacific.

That night there were 5 inaugural balls attended by JFK and his First Lady!

Who among the eminent guests, in those glittering ballrooms could possibly have foreseen that JFK would not live to finish his presidential term. He was assassinated less than three years later, on 22nd November 1963 in Dallas, Texas. His remains lie in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia.

Our Boys Magazine!

When I was a student in the Christian Brothers' School in Tralee in the 1960s, I was an avid reader of the boys' magazine "Our Boys." It was a Christian Brother promoted magazine. When putting back the Christmas decorations recently in the attic, I came across a bundle of musty, faded and tattered copies of that magazine, long forgotten and lying there for nearly 50 years. Looking through them brought back many memories.

"Our Boys" first appeared in 1914 during a period of political upheaval in Ireland and a growing sense of national identity. The purpose of the magazine was to try to compete with British Boys' magazines. It specialised in adventure stories, school stories and historical stories featuring heroic Irish characters - indigenous figures with which Irish boys could identify.

The magazine had a large circulation and many advertisers kept it going. Victor O'Donovan Power was an Irish playwright and short story writer from Kilkenny. His best-known creation was the woman of the roads, Kitty the Hare. Kitty travelled the roads of Munster telling a story in each issue- tales of poverty, ghost stories and the sadness of emigration.

There were regular articles by Paddy Crosbie of "School Around the Corner" fame and Gerrit Van Gelderen wrote articles of wildlife. William Hickey wrote the "Murphy" series of school stories and these were extremely popular. Fred Kilroy, Martin Kealy, Liam Cassidy and Edmund Burton were others who featured regularly.

TÍR na nÓG

In the centre there were eight pages in Irish under the title, "TÍR na nÓG," It included cartoons as Gaeilge such as "LABHRÁS LEIPREACHAN" and "TAIDHGÍN TRÉAN AN LEANBH LAIDIR." Every time I meet somebody called Tadhg, I immediately think of the exploits of Taidhgín Tréan (the strong baby/child) pulling a tractor with a rope!

The heading on the back page was "SMILES" where readers were invited to send in humorous 'storyettes' and prizes of 2/6 were offered for the best! Our awful jokes editor Jim C. of the RST Newsletter might be amused by some of the entries, for example:

Pupil: "Why does Joseph close his eyes when singing?"

Mr Burke: "He's so tender-hearted he hates to see people suffer!"

Foreman: "Hurry up, can you?"

Jimmy: "OK boss. Rome wasn't built in a day."

Foreman: "No, perhaps not, but I wasn't foreman on that job!"



Finally, some of our older RST Newsletter readers may remember this "offer" by Science Polish to get either a 4-shilling hurley (not much use in Kerry at that time!) or a 14-shilling handsewn football.

The Christian Brothers Schools were exclusively GAA schools at that time and so-called foreign games were not allowed! All the boys had their parents buying polish and everybody was going around with shiny shoes so that the tins could be collected as quickly as possible! To get the football 12 empty tins were required along with the money, 14 bob, as it was called! The postal order was sent to Cork but what a let down when the ball arrived? It was out of shape! It lasted only a few days. I have never used Science polish since.

We were gullible but didn't realise it. Note that the offer was FOR BOYS as very few girls or women participated in Gaelic Games in 1963. Thank God things have changed.

Television and popular weeklies like Victor, Bunty and Judy had a massive impact on the Our Boys Magazine and it ceased publication in 1990. During its heyday, in pre-TV times it was widely read in rural areas where there were no libraries. My mother always read it to us while in primary school and when it became part of the 'homework' in secondary school, we were very familiar with the content.




