Skryne's Killian Cahill moves to Brighton and Hove Albion

Skryne teenager Killian Cahill has joined Brighton and Hove Albion's under-18 squad in the January transfers.

The 18 year-old goalkeeper, who was playing with Shamrock Rovers, had been the focus of a number of UK clubs in recent months and years, with the Covid-19 pandemic and Brexit employment difficulties delaying earlier moves.

A protege of Skryne Tara AFC who went on to the Shamrock Rovers Academy, he was part of his team's success in becoming Under-19 League of Ireland Champions for 2021.

Killian, who stands at 6'3", was goalkeeper for the Hoops youngsters, and has been playing League of Ireland with them since he was 14, having joined the club at the age of 12.

Killian attended St Patrick's Classical School in Navan until the end of transition year.

He received a scholarship to Ashfield College, Dublin, to facilitate him training with Shamrock Rovers first team in the mornings, allowing him to complete his Leaving Certificate through blended learning.

While he doesn't have a soccer background, he has a strong sporting pedigree, as his parents are former Irish



athletes, Olympic hurdler, Sean Cahill, and high jumper, Terry Horgan.

The Advent of Spring

I write this on January 20th and to my absolute delight nature is already calling some sleepers deep in the earth from their winter slumbers. Snowdrops are usually the first to show their beautiful little heads. Galanthus nivalis or snowdrop is my favourite of all flowers. Given that it is such a tiny and indeed delicate flower, it punches far above its weight because it is a harbinger of spring on this island. It is viewed by many as a defiant symbol of hope despite the frost or snow covering the ground while the New Year is still in it`s infancy.

The purity of the white petals surrounded by vibrant shades of green that only nature could produce must be sufficient to gladden the heart of anyone weary after the cocooning of Covid 19 or the light -starved days of winter. Snowdrops originally came from central and eastern Europe, but by Victorian times, a single snowdrop signified death and it was considered bad luck to bring one into the house. It appears that this belief could be related to the fact that the bulb of a snowdrop for all its charms, is highly poisonous if eaten.

Called "Death`s Flower", seeing a lone snowdrop was feared because it was said to be a portent of death in England.

There are now thousands of varieties of snowdrops, but my favourites are those that grow wild beside streams, on roadsides or in damp woods. For many years in Dalgan park, (until Covid arrived and it was closed to the public), I looked forward each January to clusters of snowdrops which seemed to huddle under the giant trees from the piercing clutches of the four winds.

Of course, by mid -February, many other flowers synonymous with Spring will appear in our gardens, including crocuses and primroses all symbolising new beginnings and rebirth. And who could forget the most vaunted of them all, the daffodil. It's unforgettable trumpet-shaped flower in a glorious shade of bright yellow has inspired artists, poets and writers for hundreds of years.

As the years roll by, and it seems that each one comes around at a faster speed than its predecessor I am reminded every Spring as I walk in the garden or wander through woodland, of Mother Nature`s rhythm and her cycles of birth -death -birth.

And just like those times during recent Lockdowns when I visited deserted churches in Skryne, Navan, or Dunshaughlin to light candles, the words of Rainer Maria Rilke -Austrian poet –(1875-1926) resonate with me.

Why, then, have to be human? Oh, not because happiness exists, Nor out of curiosity... But because being here means so much; Because everything here, Vanishing so quickly, seems to need us, And strangely keeps calling to us ... To have been here once, completely, even if only once, to have been at one with the earth this is beyond undoing."

Sam Maguire

Sam Maguire was a Protestant farmer from West Cork who became a close ally of Michael Collins in London in the struggle for Irish independence. In 1928, the year after he died, the Sam Maguire Cup was created and presented to the GAA to commemorate his contributions to that quest for freedom and to the GAA.



These days, everyone knows about the Sam Maguire Cup, presented to the winner of the GAA All-Ireland football final.

But few people remember who Sam Maguire was and his birthplace, 6km north of Dunmanway in West Cork, is now a mere shell.

He is buried in St Mary's Protestant cemetery in Dunmanway, his grave marked by a Celtic cross. The local GAA grounds was named the Sam Maguire Memorial Park after him, in 1974, but otherwise, he has been completely forgotten about, as have the details of his life.

The Maguires, who were Church of Ireland, had a large farm in the townland

of Mallabraca, where Sam was born in 1879.

The family was relatively well-to-do and were noted locally for always going out of their way to help neighbours whether Protestant or Catholic.

When Sam was 20, he passed the. British civil service exam and got a job in the post office in London.

In London, he joined the London Hibernians, even though he had never played GAA at home.

However, he played in the All-Ireland finals on at least-three occasions at the beginning of the 20th century. Sam was also the only Protestant to have captained a team in the All-Ireland final.

In London, he became a close friend of Michael Collins, another West Cork man, and Sam became the head of intelligence in Britain for the Irish Republican Brotherhood.

He was also the main agent for Collins in Britain for smuggling weapons to Ireland for the War Of Independence.

Sam's work in the Post Office also meant he was able to access much vital intelligence from the mail. When the new Irish State came into being Sam supported the pro-treaty side and returned home to Ireland. He got a job with the new Irish civil service, but soon clashed with the pro-British staff who had stayed on after the treaty.

In 1924, he was dismissed from the Irish civil service, with no pension but with a gratuity of £100 from the new Free State government.

Sam returned to the family farm in West Cork, but soon developed TB. He died in 1927 at the age of 48, penniless.

On his last visit to Dunmanway, he gave away his last £5, saying that he wouldn't need it anymore.

Soon after he died a group of his friends in Dublin got together to create a permanent memorial to him. They paid £300 (just over €26,000 in today's money) to get the Sam Maguire Cup made in Dublin.

The GAA were proud to accept it as recognition of Sam's twin contributions, to the War Of Independence and his role as a Protestant player and captain in the GAA.

These days, Sam Maguire's work with Michael Collins has been almost completely airbrushed out of history, but even though his achievements have been long forgotten, his name lives on, revered by anyone with even the slightest interest in Gaelic football.

Night Sky February 2022

Sunrise: 08:09am Sunset: 5:08 pm Moon: New Moon: 1st February, First Quarter: 8th February Full Moon: 16th February (Snow Moon) Last Quarter: 23rd February.

We are in New Moon phase so dark skies in the evenings to view Orion and all his troop.

February 2nd: Evening sky has Orion in the southern sky with Jupiter followed by Neptune setting in the early evening sky in the West. Cassiopeia is in the NW (azimuth 300°) with Andromeda, Capella, and the constellation of Perseus close by.

February 7th: At 8:30 pm crescent moon in the west is close to The Pleiades and Hyades (marking the horns of Taurus) with Orion prominent in the south.

February 9th: At 7 am about one hour before sunrise, Venus already has an altitude of 10°. Directly under Venus is Mars and rising on the horizon is Mercury. From 70° through to 90° the triangle of Altair, Vega and Deneb with altitudes 50° through to 65°.

February 17th: We have a full moon. But before the moon rises between 6 - 7 pm it is worth looking for Sirius, the brightest star in the sky, always just below and to the left of Orion. It is in Canis Major (The Greater Dog) and so it is commonly referred to as the 'Dog Star'. It is 'metal rich' with double the amount of iron as our sun. It is a binary system (2 stars). Sirius B is a white dwarf (similar to the end product of our own sun, a remnant of what was once a nuclear fusing core that ran out of fuel).

February 23rd: in the evening sky (any evening in February without a strong moon) top left of Orion, try and identify the constellation of Gemini (The Heavenly Twins). Pollux is

the brighter star, Castor fainter and nearest to the pole star. Castor is a remarkable multiple system consisting of no less than six individual stars. Although they appear together in the sky they actually have no relationship as they are separated in 'line of sight' by 20 light years. Ironically Castor consists of three sets of twins as there are three double sets of stars in this system. Castor may also be part of a bigger group of stars called 'Castor Moving Group'.

February 27th: At about 6:45 am on the eastern horizon you can see Venus with Mars and a small crescent moon almost in a vertical liner. They are followed by Mercury and Saturn and then sunrise shortly after at about 7 am. So four planets, a moon and a star rising!

Betelgeuse in Orion: This star has been watched for many years. Its central hydrogen fuel has run out and its core has contracted, and its outer shell has swelled outwards. It should now be fusing helium into carbon and oxygen at its core and may be now fusing elements through neon, magnesium, sodium, silicon all the way to iron. The core will collapse, and the star will blow up as a supernova. In our sky it would be as bright as the gibbous moon and would be seen even in daylight. At 600 light years away it does not pose a threat. The supernova would be approximately 600 years old by the time the light reaches us. It would be the astronomical event of the year/decade.

2022 Events:

The JWST will is reaching its destination 1.5 million kilometres from the earth and will enter orbit around **Lagrange Point 2**. The latter is like a 'parking space' in space. JWST will effectively be orbiting nothing. It will still remain in the same line of sight with the earth and the sun at all times using minimum power to maintain its orbit, completing orbits of the sun in line with the earth.

The deployment of the sun shields (a layer of five sheets) was a huge relief for the team. It involved the correct operation of hundreds of pulleys and lines and various motors to complete the task. Each sheet is the size of a tennis court. This gives the equipment a sun protection factor of one million (as opposed to a factor 30 or 50 we are used to). This is because it is vital that there is no infrared interference (heat) from any source (including the telescope itself) other than the celestial object that the telescope is pointed at.

If successful it will revolutionize our understanding of almost every branch of astrophysics, from studying our neighbour planets to revealing the light from the earliest stars. The Hubble famous 'Ultra Deep Field' image will be studied again, a small section of seemingly empty sky that was shown to contain thousands of galaxies some over 13 billion years old (the universe is about 13.8 billion years old). The light from these earliest galaxies will have shifted into the infrared because of the expansion of the universe. JWST

imaging is designed to capture this light.

Exoplanets (newly discovered planets, about 4000 +) will be a big focus for JWST. Fifty hours has been allocated to the study of the Trappist-1 system, seven planets orbiting a small cool star in the constellation of Aquarius (see image below).

Trappist le is in the habitable zone, it is a rocky planet similar to earth and where it is thought liquid water should exist. These planets are tidally locked to their host star i.e. they show the same face to their sun at all times, similar to our moon (so either all day or all night). The planets are packed together looming large in each other's skies. So it would be like being in a system where you would look up and see continental features on the next planet. One to watch!

Moons: The important moons, mentioned in previous editions, e.g., Europa (Jupiter) and Enceladus (Saturn) will be examined closely for clues as to what lies beneath their frozen surfaces.



Artemis 1: Voyage Back to the Moon:

Main emphasis in 2022 will be the moon. Artemis 1 is NASA's multibillion dollar effort to return astronauts to the moon later in this decade. In order to carry this out, unmanned missions will have to start happening this year. The first of these missions could happen as early as **March 2022.**

Dart: NASA's DART will arrive at its destination in September 2022. The mission is designed to test a new method called the 'Kinetic Impactor' technique to deflect near earth asteroids for the purpose earth defence.

EXO Mars: The Exo Mars mission is a joint mission by ESA (European Space Agency) and the Russian space agency 'Roscosmos' to explore the red planet. It is expected to launch between August and October 2022. The rover has been named the 'Rosalind Franklin'.

Starlink: Starlink has now launched more than 1890 satellites to low earth orbit for its broadband network as it builds global coverage. Supply chain problems has delayed its roll out of user terminals.

Jeff Bezos private company 'Blue Origin' will send its first **orbital rocket** to space in late 2022 called 'New Glen'.

Juno mission will continue to explore Jupiter in 2022 and will pass close (300 kilometres) to its moon Europa.

Dream Chaser: a private spacecraft from the Sierra Nevada Corporation will start flying cargo missions to the ISS (International Space Station) in 2022.

Perseverance: Perseverance and his helicopter companion 'Ingenuity' spent Christmas on Mars. The rover has moved much closer to the delta formations in **Jezero Crater** where the river spilled over into the lake 3.7 billion years ago. It took its first sample on September 2nd 2021. Perseverance has 43 sampling tubes which will eventually be brought back to earth. Ingenuity had completed 18 flights up to recently helping to guide Perseverance on best tack to follow.

Parker Solar Probe: Nasa Solar Probe is the first ever mission to 'touch' the Sun. The spacecraft is about the size of a small car. It was launched in 2018 and is now dipping its feet into the suns atmosphere. The spacecraft uses Venus to change

its trajectory so that it can progressively pass nearer to the Sun. The temperature of the sun's surface is thousands of degrees but in the upper reaches of its atmosphere it is millions of degrees. Astronomers do not know fully why this happens but is thought to be related to the Sun's very strong gravitational field. This is a hugely important mission.

Skryne Community Alert

What is it?

The purpose of the Seniors Alert Scheme is to enable older persons of limited means to continue to live securely in their own homes with confidence, independence and peace of mind by providing them with a free personal monitored alarm. It is administered locally by community and voluntary groups from your area. Skryne Community Alert Group administer the scheme in our area.



How does it work?

Older people get a free personal alarm or pendant. The alarm can be worn as a pendant or around the wrist like a watch. When pressed it connects wirelessly to a base unit, usually attached to a phone. The base unit immediately initiates a call to a 24 hour monitored centre.

Who is eligible to apply for an alarm?

A person will be eligible if he or she is:

- Aged 65 years or older;
- Of limited means or resources;
- Living alone, living with another person who meets the eligibility criteria;
- Resides within the geographical area of Skryne Community Alert;
- Able to benefit from the equipment supplied;
- Prepared to maintain contact with Skryne Community Alert Group.

How much will it cost?

The equipment is funded through the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government. It will be installed free of charge. In the case of a landlineconnected alarm, the first year monitoring fee is also covered. You will be asked to pay the

ongoing annual monitoring fee of ≤ 66 from year 2 onwards. If you do not have a landline you can use a GSM base unit which uses a SIM card, like your mobile phone. The unit will be provided and installed free of charge, but there is an upfront charge of ≤ 66 for the SIM card credit. The first year monitoring is free, and there is an annual monitoring/SIM rental fee of ≤ 132 from year 2 onwards.

There is also now an option of a Digital Alarm which uses your broadband as the primary communication method (if you have a good broadband signal). In the event that your broadband is temporarily unavailable, it will fall back to using the provided SIM card. Pricing is the same as the above GSM option.

How do you get an alarm?

Please contact Patricia Conway (086 838 8017), or any member of Skryne Community Alert Group. We will apply for the alarm on your behalf.

Can I make an application onbehalf of another person?

Yes. You can contact Skryne Community Alert on behalf of a loved one or neighbour. However, the application details must be in that person's name.



Movie Review

While some may see them as like watching a kid smashing all his action-figures together, the genre we're going to look at this time can be exciting, colourful, and most of all action-packed; the superhero genre.



The Dark Knight (2008)

Christopher Nolan completely reinvented the superhero genre with this brooding masterpiece. From then on, superhero movies weren't only viewed as glitzy colourful sugar-rushes to entertain the kids, as *The Dark Knight* proved they could be dark, contemplative and almost Shakespearean in execution. Nolan directs with absolute gusto, especially with the many action scenes, aided by fantastic work from Christian Bale, Michael Caine and a legendary final performance from Heath Ledger which created one of the most iconic film villains of all time. Science – in-a-Box

We introduced Science-in-a-Box to the school (5th & 6th class) a few years ago and it continues to go from strength to strength. The 5th/6th class pupils have enjoyed a number of Zoom sessions weekly. Timmy, Sarah and Archie have written short accounts of the science lessons and we thank them for giving their accounts of these lessons.

Sarah (6th class)

"A few months ago we started Science-ina-Box. We do Zoom calls every Tuesday with a scientist named Caoimhe. She teaches us cool and amazing things about science. This week we got to see what our temperatures were and last week we traced our hands and cut them out. Then we taped straws on top and put string through the straws. The outcome was you were able to move it like a real hand. I really enjoy Science-in-a-Box and I hope we continue with the lessons."

Timmy (6th class)

"On Tuesday every week we do Sciencein-a-Box. Last Tuesday we learned about human physiology and vital signs. We learned about the four main things to look for to see if something is alive or not. We did an activity where we got a sheet that had breathing rate, heartbeat, temperature and reflexes on it and with "superhuman" powers such as a guy who can resist nearly any temperature, a guy with super strong arms and a guy with reflexes fast enough to cut a pellet shot from a gun. Overall it was great"

Archie (5thclass)

"Science-in-a-Box has been a great experience so far. I've enjoyed every single bit of it. We have done a lot of fun stuff through the weeks. We made models of both lungs, and a heart out of play dough. We did a skeleton puzzle. We made a model of a hand made from straws and string. We learned how to take a person's temperature, check a heart rate and do breathing and reaction tests. The scientist is very nice and Science-in-a-Box has been the best experience this year".






Scoil Cholmcille, Skryne


