
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












The sudden death of Jim Pentony, on 19th May 2021 sent waves of sadness through the RST Community where he lived all his life. Jim was 76.

Having attended Cushenstown National School and Warrenstown Agricultural College in Drumree, Jim started farming in Rathfeigh. He was a very dedicated and committed farmer, always appreciating his deep roots in the land. He was active in the IFA all his life and was a member of the Boyne Valley Lamb Producers Group.

First and most importantly, Jim Pentony was a great family man. Family was priority. We are aware of the tense rivalry between Meath and neighbours Dublin on the playing field but when it came to romance, like many RST men before and since, Jim adopted a gentler approach, and was rewarded when he met and married Marie Boylan from Garristown, in 1967. Jim and Marie are blessed with four sons.

Jim's involvement in the RST community merits a chapter on its own. The GAA was his great sporting love. He and Marie rarely missed a Meath match and travelled to the four provinces to support the Royal County. Even though he never lined out for Skryne GAA, he made a huge contribution to the club. He served on the committee for many years and was chairman of Skryne GAA in 1994. Though Jim didn't play, his sons made up for it as all four, James, Louis, Mark and Kenneth played at senior grade, with Louis captaining Skryne to victory in the senior championship final over Navan O'Mahonys in 1993.

Jim was deeply involved with Rathfeigh and District Historical Society from the beginning serving as its first chairman from its launch in November 1985. Being passionate about local and natural history, he "raised the profile of numerous important local historical sites and records." (Ref: Meath Chronicle). He and the society were instrumental in publishing six editions of "The Window on the Past" series. He instigated a "Schools' Project" in 1990, to promote the importance of local history for the children by sponsoring an art competition along with a Photo and Slide exhibition of old photographs.

Jim loved Rathfeigh National School where his four sons and grandchildren were students. He was a member of the school Board of Management and The Parents' Association on several occasions where his day-to-day knowledge and practical experience were often called on.

Politics, both local and national was one of Jim's great interests. He always supported local candidates as his expert knowledge of the local community proved invaluable. He generally had something encouraging to say even when the outlook for a candidate or even a party, was bleak. A quotation from no less a man than former Taoiseach, John Bruton, is apt in the circumstances: "Jim was a true and reliable friend in good and less good times. He will not be forgotten." (Ref: www.rip. ie condolences.)

Jim got great comfort from his strong faith. He was a Minister of the Eucharist and a bell ringer in Rathfeigh Church where his funeral Mass was said on 24th May. Jim is fondly remembered as a man with a deep sense of loyalty to his family, the RST community and the many friends he made along the road of life. He was greatly loved and is sadly missed by all who were lucky enough to have known him.

He was predeceased by his brother Michael and by his sisters, Olive, May and Enda. He is survived by his wife of 54 years, Marie (nee Boylan); sons, James (Denver, Colorado), Louis, Mark and Kenneth, (Rathfeigh); grandchildren, Isabella, Sara, Cormac, Alannah, Lucy and Aidan; daughters-in-law, Leslie, Richella, Patricia and Carol; sisters, Imelda, Ann and Joan.

Jim Pentony's funeral Mass took place at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Rathfeigh to the adjoining cemetery. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dílis.

Trying To Get Back On Track

n 1978, (two years after George died) on the same day that Anne (my Daughter) started her Nurse training in the Richmond Hospital, I started a course in "The Irish Farm Centre" on the Naas road, and when I finished that I got a job doing Farm Management Accounts, which entailed visiting each farmer on his farm every two months and recording everything that took place on the farm since my last visit.

It turned out to be a very pleasant and interesting job, as I had about sixty farmers on my books, all specialising in different types of farming, such as dairying, beef, sheep, grain growing, and sometimes mixed farming (the smallest farm was 2 acres, he grew fruit and vegetables under glass, and the largest was 1150 acres and all sizes in between, so I was meeting a different client each day, so I never got bored as there was always a "story" to hear, unfortunately, none of which I can relate here on account of confidentially.

This very comprehensive set of Farm Management Accounts, when completed at the end of the year, gave a very clear picture of how well the business was doing (or not), and it was this set of accounts that the farmer armed himself with when going to see his Bank Manager to look for the loans and grants for all the huge farm improvement schemes that were going on at that time, such as Herringbone Milking Parlours fitted out with Automatic Milking machines, selffeeders, Bulk Tanks, cattle sheds with slatted units, and the devil knows all. Sure some of them just stopped short of wallpapering them !!!

Unfortunately, it was not very long after, that the Country hit a terrible slump, when interest rates went through the roof, as high as 22% and 23% I recorded in some cases. Now with those sorts of costs it was almost impossible to stay afloat, and indeed some farmers and small businesses did go under, never to recover.

I was doing this job for about three and a half years, and I was enjoying it when Fate took a hand in my life.




When Silence Hurts

Movie Review

There's nothing more thrilling than being right up close with the destruction of combat, so this time we're going to look at the war genre. Here is my top three, must-see war movies;



Apocalypse Now (1979)

In 1979, America was still reeling from the Vietnam War. Though The Deer Hunter came out the year before, that film still largely sympathised with the American soldiers. No audience was ready for Apocalypse Now. Not only showing the brutality of war but the mental deterioration of the soldier's minds, this filmed portrayed crazed generals committing genocide and brainwashed soldiers blindly following their orders. Starring cinema legends like Marlon Brando, Robert Duvall and Martin Sheen, Apocalypse Now crackles with scene after scene of masterfully executed death and destruction. An epic in every sense of the word, Francis Ford Coppola's masterpiece is the greatest war movie ever made.



Saving Private Ryan (1998)

The D-Day Landings and other military victories had been shown in films before with trumpet-y fanfare common with the genre during the 50s and 60s. Saving Private Ryan told everyone it wasn't going to be that movie and they sure as hell believed it, as the film starts with the visceral, harrowing and altogether iconic Omaha Beach Landings scene. The scene captures the tone and feel of the film and showed the audience the stuff they hadn't read about in the history books, the brutal reality of the countless lives lost in the name of victory. Although, since the film is helmed by Steven Spielberg, the director does what he did with his Best Picturewinning Schindler's List and balances the grim realism with a sense of optimism. Masterfully directed by Spielberg and featuring a cast of brilliant actors led by Tom Hanks, Saving Private Ryan is an unflinching masterpiece that is unlike anything you've ever seen.



Lawrence of Arabia (1962)

Lawrence of Arabia's enormous runtime would be enough to turn anyone off, as the film clocks in at nearly four hours. However director David Lean uses this time to tell the story of T.E. Lawrence and his experiences in the Ottoman Empire's provinces in Hejaz and Greater Syria during World War I. Lean uses his signature wide lens to give us magnificent shots of the Arabian deserts and their inhabitants, all the while still focusing on Lawrence's emotional struggles with his own identity and his divided allegiance between his native Britain with its army and his new-found comrades within the Arabian desert tribes. The epic of all epics, Lawrence of Arabia cements director David Lean's status in the filmmaking pantheon with nearly four hours of grand scope, brilliant performances by Peter O'Toole, Alec Guinness and Omar Sharif, and beautiful cinematography.

If you're looking for more war movies, check out Inglourious Basterds, Jojo Rabbit, Platoon, The Deer Hunter, Dunkirk, The Bridge on the River Kwai and Good Morning Vietnam.

Night Sky July 2021

Sunset: 10 30 pm Sunrise: 5 45 am

Moon:

August 8th – New Moon (no moon visible) August 22nd – Full Moon

August 15th – First Quarter (half-moon visible) August 30th – Last Quarter (half-moon visible)

During August the nights are longer and darker and astronomical viewing improves.

This month is excellent for viewing Jupiter and Saturn as they appear in the night sky after 11 pm. They are in opposition i.e. brightest and closest to the earth. As the month progresses Saturn and Jupiter come into the evening sky.

4th August:

Saturn rises at 9 pm and at 11 pm has an azimuth of 147° and altitude of 11°. Jupiter rises at 945 pm and at 11 pm it has an azimuth of 128° and altitude of 10°. The moon does not rise until 2 am and is a small crescent shape.



View through a 6 inch telescope:

This is the image you should see through an average small telescope looking at Jupiter (moons not necessarily in this order). The bright lights either side are the moons of Jupiter. The moons will be in different positions as they rotate around Jupiter. Some of these moons were first seen by Galileo in 1690 and recognized by him as satellites of Jupiter. Galileo discovered four moons, Io, Europa, Callisto, Ganymede, known as the Galilean Moons, all 79 moons of Jupiter are known collectively as the **Jovian Moons**. They were the first objects found to orbit a planet other than the earth. The earth centred universe of the world for 2000 years was gone confirming the Copernican revolution. Lenses had already been invented in Holland for spectacles etc. but Galileo used them in a tube to view the night sky. He was very careful to restrict access to his telescope until his own place in history had been assured. (See images on YouTube of Juno and Cassini spacecraft missions to Jupiter and Saturn.) You can monitor the moon positions over the month as Galileo did. On the evening of the 4th August, close in on Jupiter, are the moons Europa, Ganymede and Io and further out to the right is Callisto.

Saturn moons of Lapetus, Titan, Rhea, Hyperion are further out from the planet, and closer to Saturn are the moons Dione, Enceladus, Tethys and Mimas. At this time Titan and Enceladus are prime targets for life forms with missions planned to both. Saturn and Jupiter will continue to stay bright during the month. Remember Saturn is the most distant of the five planets that are easily visible to the naked eye, and is therefore fainter than Jupiter. It rotates rapidly, about every 11 hours, and takes about 30 earth years to orbit the sun. It has 60 known moons.

August 2nd & 3rd: if you can get out of bed for 3 am (if the skies are clear) rising from the East will be a beautiful crescent moon, above it the beautiful star cluster of the Pleiades, and just under the moon a V shape, that is sideways, representing the horns of the bull in Taurus with the star Aldebaran the bright star at the end of the V shape. It is the Arabic name for 'Follower' as it seems to follow the Pleiades. Above all this is the constellation of Perseus (see August 12th)

August 10th: In the western sky the sun is setting followed by Mercury and Mars, and slightly further back is a crescent moon followed by Venus. These are all visible to the naked eye, they are low in the west, best viewed with a binoculars.

August 12th is the next peak of the Perseids meteor showers (best of the year) with about 110 meteors per hour. It is in the constellation of Perseus close under Cassiopeia (the W shape in the sky), azimuth 30° and altitude 30°, and have a look for the Andromeda Galaxy to the right (azimuth 58° and altitude 30°) all in North to North-East.

August 20th about 11 pm Saturn is directly above a full moon with Jupiter, Neptune and Uranus trailing behind.

August 22nd Full Blue Moon on the night of August 21st, also known as The Sturgeon Moon because the giant sturgeon of the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain were most readily caught during this part of the summer. Also, at 230 am on 22nd, Jupiter makes a close approach in the sky to the Blue Moon.

Rare black hole and neutron star collisions:

Scientists have detected recently two separate collisions between a black hole and a neutron star.

A neutron star is created when a massive star collapses and protons and neutrons are crushed together leaving behind one of nature's amazing creations, a neutron star. It is the size of a large city containing about 1.5 to 2.5 solar masses. It's so dense that a teaspoon of the material can weigh more than 2 billion tons. Such a huge collision between two astronomical giants sends ripples through the fabric of space and this is

picked up by laser interferometers on earth. These are known as gravitational waves and they travel at the speed of light and this was the last theory of General Relativity by Einstein to be confirmed. They were detected by the LIGO detector in the United States and the Virgo detector in Italy. The merger took place 900 million light years away. These ripples, by the time they reach us, are less than the width of an atom. The gravitational wave detectors are among the most sensitive instruments ever constructed. This discovery has implications for planet and galaxy formation.

European Astronauts:

A total of 22,589 individuals filled out the online form of which 5419 were women. This is nearly three times the number from a similar competitive process in 2008. Appointments will be made in 2022. These applications can lead to other rolls within the agency (ESA). 270 Irish candidates applied. Good luck to all of them.

UFO's: Are we Alone? A report was recently released this month by the American Government regarding unidentified flying objects. Many of the reports were of unusual objects with movement patterns or flight characteristics showing advanced, unknown technological capabilities. In some cases military aircraft processed some radio frequency energy associated with these sightings. No clear conclusions were reached.

The real search for extra-terrestrial life is by the SETI Institute (Search for extra-terrestrial Intelligence). It has more than 100 scientists investigating the nature of the universe and the prevalence of life beyond Earth. The only real signal received has been the **Wow! Signal** in 1977. The signal appeared to come from the direction of Sagittarius and bore all the hallmarks of an extra-terrestrial origin. It lasted for 72 seconds but it has never been detected since. Scientists are now using a large number of small radio dishes carrying out wide-sky surveys and targeted searches. Scientists generally discount UFO sightings in favour of the work of SETI. Although life in many forms may be plentiful in the universe, complex life may be far less so. We do not know, yet.

Branson:

Sir Richard Branson successfully reached the edge of space on board his Virgin Galactic rocket plane. The height reached was 53 miles. He was accompanied on the mission by two pilots and three Galactic employees. They were presented with commercial astronaut wings. He expects to start to begin selling space tourism seats to customers next year.

Jeff Bezos:

Jeff Bezos (Amazon), Mark Bezos (his brother), Wally Funk (82 years old, oldest astronaut in space) and Oliver Daemen (18 years old, youngest astronaut in space). The space-ship New Shepard reached a height of 62 mls or 100 kms (the Karmin **Line**) and by so became the first commercial vehicle under a suborbital reusable launch vehicle to fly paying customers, both payloads and astronauts, to space and back.

Comet Bernardinelli-Bernstein

which is about 200 kms in diameter, i.e. about 10 times the diameter of previous comets, and it will make its closest approach to the sun in 2031. The comet originated in the **Oort Cloud**, beyond our planetary system, comprising ejected material from the early history of the Solar System. First seen in 2014 it has an orbit perpendicular to the plane of the Solar System. Its closest point of approach will be 11 AU (Astronomical Units, distance from earth to the Sun). So it will require large telescopes to monitor its trajectory). It will be studied intensively to understand the nature of objects in the Oort Cloud.

Last Call

With a flick of his wrist, the book closed over. "Another case closed. Literally. I would say I'll take the weekend off, but after '25 I don't bother", thought Sam as he sat back in his chair and took in his office.

It wasn't a bad office after only three years of being a private detective. Sam wasn't a man for clutter, so he only had two chairs: big and small. The large cushioned, red chair was for any potential clients (cannot have a first impression that I skimp on the money). The diminutive chair was the one thing that remained from Sam's very first case and it hadn't left the office since. 

Personal Safety Holiday Security



Introduction

This leaflet addresses three keys areas relating to your . holiday security as follows -

- Preparation plans and securing your property
- Safety when travelling
- Protecting your children

Preparation Plans and Securing your property Before you go:

- Find out about the place you are visiting. Is it safe for visitors? Are there any local laws or customs, which are different to home, that you should be aware of?
- Be familiar with security measures at airports and/or seaports. Many common household items • cannot be carried as hand luggage on planes.
- Inform a trusted neighbour or relative as to your travel arrangements, intended destination and . contact details. Do not unwittingly advertise your travel arrangements to others.
- Invite neighbours to make use of your driveway . for car parking.
- Arrange to have your lawn mowed, particularly . when absent for long periods in summer.

- Cancel your milk, paper deliveries etc.
- Arrange for a neighbour or relative to collect your mail or use Mailminder from An Post.
- Make full use of light timing devices and do not have curtains drawn during the day time. Your neighbour may oblige with this duty.
- If you have a domestic alarm inform your monitoring centre of your absence and ensure any nominated key holders will attend promptly to any activation.
- Be aware of any insurance limitations on vacant premises.
- Notify your local Gardaí of your absence from home.
- Invest in a quality safe for any valuables left in your home.
- Carry out a "housekeeping" exercise around the grounds of your home and remove and secure any unsecured items.

Safety when travelling -

- Use your work address on items of luggage.
- Record separately details of the following items:
 - Your passport and driving licence.
 - All credit and bank cards.
 - Travel documents.
 - Emergency contact numbers for each of these services. If you have a mobile phone, these contact numbers should be saved on the phone using international access prefixes.
 - Have your vehicle fully serviced prior to departure and ensure you have replacement bulbs, emergency equipment etc.
 - If you are using a roof rack for luggage, park only in secure car parks and remove it when not necessary.
 - Know where you are going and, if you need to stop, use only established service station areas.
 - Be cautious of stopping for strangers or "persons in trouble" - call the Gardaí or local police.

Protecting your children

- Teach your children your full address and contact telephone numbers including how to call the Gardaí or local police in the event of an emergency.
- If your child gets lost teach them how to report to a security person, store manager, the Gardaí or local police.
- Advise them on the tactics that are used by abductors to approach them e.g. to go looking for a lost pet, offering gifts etc. Tell them they should never to go with strangers, into houses or cars regardless of what explanation or inducement is being offered.
- Tell your children to inform you immediately if a stranger has approached them. Never dress your children with their name conspicuously on their clothing, as a stranger may use their name to get their attention. Tell them to run, scream and where to go if a person tries to touch or grab them.
- Parents or guardians should accompany children to toilets in public places.
- Survey the recreation places your child uses point out the likely danger areas - alleyways, concealed places, recesses etc.

Finally, never delay in reporting a missing child. Ensure you have an up-to-date photo with you.

Scammers and fraudsters operate the world over and Carry a mobile phone and know how to contact you are no more immune from their activities when on the emergency services in the area you are visit- holiday than when you are at home. Indeed in many ing. Know where you are if they need to locate locations, persons on holiday are frequently targeted by fraudsters and scammers.

- The bogus exclusive holiday club which promises a lot but generally fails to deliver
- The phoney '2 for 1' voucher often relating to restaurant meals which, when attempting to redeem, is found to be 'out of date' or 'no longer
- The bogus taxi driver "Beat the queue, sir, come with me", except you often end up taking the scenic route and paying far more than necessary
- Unofficial currency exchange scams great rates offered but often found to contain counterfeit notes or blank paper in the middle of the bundle of notes handed back to you.

The old sayings "if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is" and "caveat emptor (buyer beware)" must always be considered.
