

SKRYNE G.F.C. 3 YEAR DEVELOPMENT PLAN Need for Fundraising!!

During October 1998 a detailed survey of our membership, players, officials, parents and supporters of Skryne G.F.C. was carried out. Analysis of the survey was used in formulating a Three Year Development Plan for the year 1999 to 2001. This plan was adopted unanimously at the Club's A.G.M. in December 1998.

The survey highlighted the deficiencies in the facilities we have available and necessary improvements as follows were set out as TARGETS TO THE PLAN:

- · Secure additional pitches
- Drain existing pitch
- · Install proper flood-lighting
- Improve Clubhouse facilities
- · All-weather training area.

Research on the appropriate work necessary has been carried out by the Club and Budget Costings have indicated that approximately £80,000 is required. Skryne G.F.C. has always been one of the leading clubs in Meath and we are determined to make sure that our facilities are capable of servicing the Club and its membership.

This is the reason we have undertaken this major fundraising House Draw and we again ask for the support of the Parish. Also we have applied for funding from the National Lottery and also will obtain grants and loans from the G.A.A.

LAWN PERFECTION

The centre-piece for most gardens is a good lawn and it is amazing how it can set off the rest of the plants. If shrubs and flowers are not so hot, but the lawn is good, the garden will look better than it really is.

This is a critical time of year for lawns. With increasing soil temperatures, the level of growth is high. However, quite often, grass has responded poorly to improving growing conditions due to a shortage of plant nutrients in the soil. Therefore a lawn will get hungry over a period of years. When the grass is cut, nutrients are removed and if the lawn is mowed up to 30 times each summer, the reservoir of nutrients will soon be depleted. Lawn grass needs a moderately high level of nutrition to grow well. Starved grass is pale green, yellow or even brown. It makes little growth and cannot compete with broad-leaved plants that draw nutrients from deeper in the ground. The broad-leaved plants are typical lawn weeds, such as dandelions, daisies and buttercups. Moss also thrives when growth is poor. Feeding with lawn fertiliser will restore the levels of nutrients and encourage good growth and good colour. To avoid too vigorous a grass growth, it is important to apply small amounts at two month intervals, starting in late March or April. If you want to have grass free of weeds, then feed regularly and use a lawn weedkiller during a warm spell of weather. If you want to have some wildflowers in the grass, limit the amount of lawn fertiliser used and not use any weedkiller.



Press Release: Anti Mill Factory Campaign in full swing

Our campaign is in full swing in objecting to the planning application by Edward Kavanagh (Maynooth,) Co.Kildare for an animal feed mill factory at Oberstown.

Meath Co. Council have to date received 50 formal objections from local residents plus a petition signed by 140 residents objecting to the proposed development. The local committee wish to again reiterate their concerns about the plant, in the planning application to the Council it states that the plant will operate on a 24 hour basis and provide only 30 jobs which will be filled by existing employees in Maynooth and Ashbourne. There will be no local employment bonanza.

Again it is our view that this type of industry should be located in an industrial area which has the infrastructure to match its needs. The mill building will be 123 feet tall and will significantly impact on the visual amenity of the Hill of Skryne and the Hill of Tara.

Both Tara and Skryne are areas of significant historical and archaeological importance and form an important part of the heritage tourism industry in our county and last but not least are areas of significant pride among the people of our parish. To allow this development will create a permanent eyesore for us all, impact on our heritage and create a significant traffic hazard on all of our roads. On this point you can be sure that vehicles going to and from the factory will use every shortcut available and before long all our roads will be in a very poor condition something which we have had to put up with for too long.


At a considerable cost we have engaged a firm of planning consultants to put together a professional objection on our behalf and this is at its final stages and will be lodged with the Council next week. It is important if you have not already done so to write to the Council if you wish to object quoting the planning application no. 99/395.

Finally the local election will be held in June and when candidates are looking for your vote express to them your objections to this development and ask them for a commitment to assist with our campaign to STOP this factory from going ahead.
