



FERGAL O'REILLY

28 September 1936 – 7 November 2013

It was with great shock and sadness that we learned of the sudden death of Fergal O'Reilly on November 7th. Fergal was larger than life and was known by everyone in the area, he didn't stand on ceremony and we all have memories of his witty remarks and observations. A lifelong teetotaller, he was one of the mainstays of the Skryne/Rathfeigh Pioneer Centre, and had been president for the previous ten years.

He did Trojan work year after year raising money to send invalids to Lourdes; his annual auction in the hall raising many thousands of Euros towards this end. He was a frequent visitor to Lourdes himself and any of us who had the pleasure of his company on the pilgrimages were well marshalled as we followed his and Rosemary's lead.

Fergal hailed from Dulane, Kells and in his younger days he was very involved in football and music. He played the accordion with a ceile band for a number of years and had the honour of winning a Meath GAA Juvenile medal with Carnaross in 1950

His working career began in McEvoys, Brews Hill, where he served his time as a butcher. He was then attracted by the bright lights of Dublin, gaining employment in a butcher's shop in Moore St. This explains a lot about Fergal's quick wit, it would be nice to be a fly on the wall watching him giving as good as he got from the legendary hawkers and street sellers. His next move was to Lipton's in Bray where he worked until his move to Skryne in 1972. Following his move to Skryne he diversified into plumbing and building and threw himself into the life of the parish. He carried out the door to door collections for many years and was very involved in organising the very popular Pioneer talent competitions in Skryne Hall. He also threw his weight behind the bingo which continues to be an attractive outing for many people.

We will all miss Fergal and the RST area is the poorer with his passing.

Our Sympathies are with Breda and his family who asked us to extend their sincere thanks to all who came to the house, attended the funeral and sent cards. Just being there was a great consolation to them all.





THOUGHT

If a preacher were to start his sermon today by saying: "Christmas is oft referred to as the season of peace and goodwill," many of his congregation would probably tune their minds to a different wavelength and reflect on some more mundane aspect of Christmas – like paying the bills – on the grounds that when it came to peace and goodwill they had heard it all before. But just how familiar are we with this particular aspect of the Christmas message

How many people, given the quotation "Peace and Goodwill to men" in a competition in which they were asked to "spot the error" would fail to notice the mistake? Quite a few, for we have come vaguely to accept that this is the correct quotation and that if a majority want peace and goodwill these qualities will be generated spontaneously throughout society.

But peace is not as easily established a quality as that. Like everything else in life it has a price. Tragically, it is a price that many are reluctant to pay and which many find it impossible to pay.


The message which the shepherds heard from the angels of the first Christmas was not "Peace and Goodwill to men". It was, as St. Luke records: "Peace to men of goodwill". There is our price – goodwill.

Many demand "peace and justice". But justice for whom? Manifestly, if there are opposing factions, what constitutes justice to one faction is injustice to another. If it were otherwise they would not be seeking peace – they would already have it! Many seek "peace at a price" – but the price must always be paid by someone else! These demands have an inherent aggressiveness so they inevitably generate illwill and where there is illwill there can be no peace.

If nations, if opposing factions, if sectors of society, if individual members of a family cannot approach one another with goodwill they cannot hope to find true peace.

Is goodwill so very high a price to pay? As the very word implies, it requires an effort of the will. It presupposes some compromise. But if people seek peace with sincere goodwill they are already willing to accept at least some degree of mutual compromise. The spirit of goodwill approaches with its hands held out before it, empty, offering peace, petitioning peace, its heart willing, in the lovely Irish word, to "disremember" a past which has caused hurt, rancour, bitterness; to concede that the guilt for the faults of the past which gave rise to illwill does not rest exclusively on one person, on one faction, or on one nation. It is a shared guilt.

At Christmas we celebrate the birthday of the Prince of Peace. Let us do all we can during the Christmas season to cultivate and spread the spirit of goodwill so that we may earn for ourselves and others the gift for which the human heart yearns most earnestly: the gift of Peace.

A VISIT FROM ST. NICHOLAS

'Twas the night before Christmas, when all thro' the house Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse; The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, In hopes that St. Nicholas soon would be there;

The children were nestled all snug in their beds, While visions of sugar plums danc'd in their heads, And Mama in her 'kerchief, and I in my cap, Had just settled our brains for a long winter's nap.

When out on the lawn there arose such a clatter, I sprang from the bed to see what was the matter. Away to the window I flew like a flash, Tore open the shutters, and threw up the sash.

The moon on the breast of the new fallen snow, Gave the luster of mid-day to objects below; When, what to my wondering eyes should appear, But a miniature sleigh, and eight tiny reindeer,

With a little old driver, so lively and quick, I knew in a moment it must be St. Nick. More rapid than eagles his coursers they came, And he whistled, and shouted, and call'd them by name:

"Now! Dasher, now! Dancer, now! Prancer and Vixen, "On! Comet, on! Cupid, on! Donder and Blitzen; "To the top of the porch! To the top of the wall! "Now dash away! Dash away! Dash away all!"

As dry leaves that before the wild hurricane fly, When they meet with an obstacle, mount to the sky; So up to the house-top the coursers they flew, With the sleigh full of toys — and St. Nicholas too: And then in a twinkling, I heard on the roof The prancing and pawing of each little hoof. As I drew in my head, and was turning around, Down the chimney St. Nicholas came with a bound:

He was dress'd all in fur, from his head to his foot, And his clothes were all tarnish'd with ashes and soot; A bundle of toys was flung on his back, And he look'd like a peddler just opening his pack:

His eyes — how they twinkled! His dimples: how merry, His cheeks were like roses, his nose like a cherry; His droll little mouth was drawn up like a bow, And the beard of his chin was as white as the snow;

The stump of a pipe he held tight in his teeth, And the smoke it encircled his head like a wreath. He had a broad face, and a little round belly That shook when he laugh'd, like a bowl full of jelly:

He was chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf, And I laugh'd when I saw him in spite of myself; A wink of his eye and a twist of his head Soon gave me to know I had nothing to dread.

He spoke not a word, but went straight to his work, And fill'd all the stockings; then turn'd with a jerk, And laying his finger aside of his nose And giving a nod, up the chimney he rose.

He sprung to his sleigh, to his team gave a whistle, And away they all flew, like the down of a thistle: But I heard him exclaim, ere he drove out of sight — Happy Christmas to all, and to all a good night. —Clement Clarke Moore

Clement Moore, the author of the poem Twas the night before Christmas, was a reticent man and it is believed that a family friend, Miss H. Butler, sent a copy of the poem to the New York Sentinel who published the poem. The condition of publication was that the author of Twas the night before Christmas was to remain anonymous. The first date publication was 23rd December 1823 and it was an immediate success. It was not until 1844 that Clement Clarke Moore claimed ownership when the work was included in a book of his poetry. The poem 'Twas the night before Christmas' has redefined our image of Christmas and Santa Claus. Prior to the creation of the story of 'Twas the night before Christmas' St. Nicholas, the patron saint of children, had never been associated with a sleigh or reindeers!

The Origin of Santa Claus

Santa Claus, Saint Nicholas, Saint Nick, Father Christmas, Kris Kringle, Santy, Jolly Old Elf, Santa Klaus or simply Santa, is a gift-giving figure in various cultures who distributes presents to children and adults, traditionally during the night of December 24, Christmas Eve, while everyone is sleeping. The popular American form Santa Claus originated as a mispronunciation of Dutch Sinterklaas, which is a contracted form of Sint Nicolaas (Saint Nicholas). On Christmas Eve of 1822, another New Yorker, Clement Clarke Moore, wrote down and read to his children a series of verses; his poem was published a year



later as "An Account of a Visit from St. Nicholas" (more commonly known today by its opening line, "'Twas the night before Christmas . . ."). Moore gave St. Nick eight reindeer (and named them all), and he devised the now-familiar entrance by chimney. Moore's Nicholas was still a small figure, however - the poem describes a "miniature sleigh" with a "little old driver." Meanwhile, in parts of Europe such as Germany, Nicholas the gift-giver had been superseded by a representation of the infant Jesus (the Christ child, or "Christkindlein"). The Christkindlein accompanied Nicholas-like figures with other names (such as "Père Noël" in France), or he travelled with a dwarf-like helper (known in some places as "Pelznickel," or Nicholas with furs). Belsnickle (as Pelznickel was known in the German-American dialect of Pennsylvania) was represented by adults who dressed in furry disguises (including false whiskers), visited while children were still awake, and put on a scary performance. Gifts found by children the next morning were credited to Christkindlein, who had come while everyone was asleep. Over time, the non-visible Christkindlein (whose name mutated into "Kriss Kringle") was overshadowed by the visible Belsnickle, and both of them became confused with St. Nicholas and the emerging figure of Santa Claus. The modern Santa Claus derived from these two images: St. Nicholas the elf-like gift bringer described by Moore, and a friendlier "Kriss Kringle" amalgam of the Christkindlein and Pelznickel figures. The man-sized version of Santa became the dominant image around 1841, when a Philadelphia merchant named J.W. Parkinson hired a man to dress in "Criscringle" clothing and climb the chimney outside his shop.

The idea of having a new community centre in the Rathfeigh/Skryne/Tara (RST) area was first suggested by Ms Clare Rogan back in 2008/9 when a Community Draw was being organized by Skryne GFC. This "dream" came to fruition on Sunday 8th December 2013, when the New RST Community Centre, located on the first floor of Skryne GAA Clubhouse, was informally opened.

We, the Board of the RST Community Centre, were delighted with the huge numbers of visitors on the day. Reactions varied from "Wow!", "What a beautiful building!", "Brilliant workmanship", "Lovely colour scheme", "Spacious rooms", "Love your kitchen", "What a view from the balcony!", "Great, you have a lift!", "That's a fab sliding door", etc.

FINANCE

This new centre cost $\in 205,000$. All the money has been raised and we expect final financial settlement early in the new year. The Board wishes to acknowledge the strong support of Skryne GFC as $\in 50,000$ of the proceeds of the House Draw was set aside for the centre. We weresuccessful in our application to Meath Partnership for a grant of $\in 150,000$ under the Leader Program for Community Projects. As we were granted public money, the tendering process under EU procurement rules was strictly adhered to. Gerry Tuite's company, AGT Contracts, won the contact and as you can see, did a wonderful professional job with work of excellent quality. Thanks to Gerry for his commitment, patience and thorough personal attention to every detail.

THE 300 CLUB

When a project like this is under way, there are many extra costs incurred so the Board set up a monthly draw. The draw, known as the 300 Club Draw, is limited to 300 members and costs \in 5 per line per month. Each month

 \in 500 is returned in prize money We are extremely grateful to those of you who already support this draw. There are still some places available in the draw and we would love to fill those places to maximize income to help us defray our bridging loan interest payments (until our grant comes through), along with other incidental expenses.

USE OF THE RST COMMUNITY CENTRE.

The RST Community Centre is a public utility building to enhance the RST area. The centre is for everyone's use. It is your centre. You, the RST residents are now the stakeholders of this new facility. We must all get together and put the centre to work. The success of the centre depends on YOU.

This must of course be done in an organized way. We propose to have a timetable of events posted up so that everybody can see what is happening and where. There are three rooms (of different sizes and shapes), and a kitchen, so different activities can take place at the same time. I know that it would be far more challenging for me to take on this project within my own life if I had, say, children or a mortgage. I know no one likes being pushed or 'guilt-tripped' into doing anything. So I don't harp on about our responsibility to each other and our environment in every single post, nor do I bombard readers with links to sites and videos that will melt your head...that 'head-melt' factor has certainly been an element of my experience of living more consciously.

I will however, ask you to take a step back within your own life, and question. Ask yourself what you can do. Think about where this one item you never thought about came from. Consider who put in the hours that brought you this other item at the affordable price for which you nabbed it. Is there an area of your life you've never questioned? Maybe now is the time to do so.



JUVENILE 8 – 12 YEAR OLDS

While the emphasis is still on fun and enjoyment, all children are encouraged to compete in either cross country or track and field events. The fundamentals of sprinting, hurdles, distance running and field events, such as long jump, shot putt, javelin and now high jump are coached and the emphasis is on exposing these young athletes to a variety of events, to develop different skills, good coordination and balance, and also to prevent injury. Training is at the track every thursday and on Sunday morning at 11am on the Hill of Tara.
